IN MEMORIAM

MARY CATHERINE GILLIS.

Miss Mary Catherine Gillis was born at Lyndale 39 years ago. Died in Cambridge Mass Sept. 19th where she resided. (She was one of nine children born to Mr. and Mrs. Malcolm Gillis. The parents and four of the family have passed on. Three brothers and two sisters survive the departed. Two of these brothers have enlisted in overseas service. One brother Roderick is in Alberta, one sister Marjorie in British Columbia and Margaret who resided recently in Wellsley Hills, Mass. BRITISH SMOKE BOX SAVES GREAT NUMBERS OF SHIPS.

LONDON, Sept. 24.—The Press Association hears on high Naval authority that the new defensive measures against submarine warfare are meeting with success, justifying the hope of a further reduction in the losses, and says it can be stated an official authority that the results of the methods adopted in the past month give cause for growing confidence.

According to an Admiralty statement, dozens of ships have been saved by the smoke box system, which the Admiralty during the past few months has supplied to a majority of British merchantmen.

PLAN CENSORSHIP OF FOREIGN MAILS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—A provision for censorship, under regulations of the President, under cable radio or other communication between the United States and foreign countries, was written into the Administration Trading-With-the-Enemy bill late today by the Senate and House conferees at a special meeting.

It is designed to prevent military information from reaching Germany by relay through Latin-American and other neutral countries. The provision was inserted at the request of Federal departments having knowledge that many messages have reached Germany, in code, by steamer and otherwise. It was made a part of the conferees' report concluded yesterday and will be presented to the Senate Saturday. The section reads:

"Whenever during the present war the President shall deem that the public safety demands, he may cause to be censored, under such rules and regulations as he may from time to time establish, communications by mail, cable, radio or other means of transmission passing between the United States and any such foreign countries as he may specify, or which may be carried by any vessel or other means of transportation touching at any port or place or territory and bound to or from any such foreign territory."

Another clause provides heavy penalties against "any person who willfully evades or attempts to evade the submission of any such communication to such censorship or who willfully uses or attempts to use any code or other device for the purpose of concealing from such censorship the intended meaning of such communication."

A general mails provision is now in operation, under a provision of the Espionage act, but the new provision is regarded as greatly extending Government censorship authority.

The conferees were advised that many messages which have been intercepted are in the Government's possession in addition to those recently made public by the State Department in connection with transmission of information through official Swedish channels.

Since the attack on Gen Pershing's expedition, due to advance information, the Government is said to have been extremely active in waylaying treasonable messages.

TRIAL CHINESE DIVISION TO GO OVER

PEKIN, September 24.—(Delayed)—The president and the cabinet have agreed to the plan of sending a trial division of 24,000 Chinese soldiers to France, if money, equipment and shipping are available. The entente allies have approved the proposition and France is eager to receive the contingent.

The premier is in favor of sending 300,000 men, and the provincial authorities are heartily in support of the plan in the event that the Canton provincial government gives its approval of the war with Germany.
