(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) TRENTON, N. J., July 5.—Its pay day for the Hauptmann jurors. What's more, the jurors hopes of getting double pay—\$6 a day for 45 days service have been realized.

After weeks of waiting while the Legislature passed a supplemental appropriation bill to cover additional trial expenses, the comptroller's office forward today to Sheriff John H. Curtis, of Hunterdon County a cheque which included \$258 for each of the 12 jurors.

The usual rate of \$3 was doubled because the jurors were locked up each night. The total cost of the trial paid by the state, was \$125,000.

U.S. REFERS PROBLEM TO THE LEAGUE

Secretary Hull Thinks Differences Between Italy and Ethiopia Can Be Settled By Peaceful Means.

WASHINGTON, July 5.—The United States tonight side-stepped entanglement in the Italo-Ethiopian crisis by suggesting in effect that the League of Nations, which already is arbitrating the dispute, continue its efforts to achieve a peaceful solution.

Secretary of State Cordell Hull, in a note dispatched to Halle Selassie I, Emperor of Ethiopia, added that the United States was "loath to believe" either Italy or Ethiopia "would resort to other than pacific means" or "would permit any situation to arise which would be inconsistent with the commitments" of the Kellogg-Briand peace pact.

The note, answering the Ethiopian appeal that the United States invoke the pact to prevent what was called a threatened invasion by Italy, was read by observers here as an effort to avoid entanglement in a dangerous controversy and at the same time reassert United States belief in the sanctity of treaties.

Some observers here pressed to see Hull's reference to the United States Government's belief that Italy and Abyssinia would both live up to the provisions of the pact of Paris as an inferential invocation of that treaty.

The Secretary of State, in a note which was transmitted to William Perry Cooze, United States Charge d' Affairs in Addis Ababa, for delivery to the "King of Kings," declared that the United States was interested in the "maintenance of peace in all parts of the world, and gratified that the League of Nations has given its attention to the controversy."

The United States, Hull added, was confident that "whatever the facts or merits of the controversy may be," the league would be able to arrive "at a decision satisfactory to both of the Governments immediately concerned."

Richard Connolly Victim of Tetanus

Victim of tetanus, which resulted from infection to his toe, Richard Connolly, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. John L. Connolly, of Flint, O'Connor township, died Saturday afternoon. He was a former resident of Fort William, having resided at 228 Cumming Street. He was born at East Royalty, June 25th, 1920.

Richard, while out in the field near his home about two weeks ago, stepped on a sharp stub of brush which pierced his rubber, wounding his toe. The wound partly healed but on Friday last week he became violently ill and was removed to McKellar hospital. He died Saturday afternoon.

The late Richard Connolly came to Fort William with his family in 1924. While a resident in the city he attended Central school. Shortly after learning to swim as a member of the Gyro swimming class, he saved his brother James from drowning. The family moved to the farm in O'Connor township in 1932.

Besides his parents he is survived by four brothers and three sisters. They are: John 20, Thomas 18, James 13, William 7, Betty 17, Peggy 4, and Catherine 3.
