HARRIS CORPUS APPLICATION.—The hearing of the application for discharge of Matthew Phelan, a Scott Act offender now in jail, took place yesterday before Mr. Justice Hodgson. The facts of the case are as follows: Some 18 months or more ago, the present Sheriff, then acting Justice of the Peace, together with one Mr. Logan another Justice, convicted the said Phelan of an offence against the Canada Temperance Act. The warrant of commitment however was not signed by the Justice until after the appointment of Mr. Harris as Sheriff. Mr. Stewart, for Phelan, contended that the warrant was illegal. The Attorney General opposed this contention showing that it was only necessary for one of the Justices to sign the warrant, and that the signature of Mr. Harris in addition did not vitiate it.
