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R. P. CLERK BE-ALL-AMERICAN FORE CUSTOMS FLEET OBJECT PROBE OF I. M. M.

Tells of Shipping Liquor Samples to Gov't Officials.
EX-MINISTER OF CUSTOMS
Suspected of Receiving Liquor Stolen From the King's Warehouse.

OTTAWA, April 27.—Liquor samples taken by the Customs gauger in Montreal port have always been considered the property of that office and the chief inspector of the port has shared them from time to time.

R. P. Clerk, Inspector of the port, told the Customs probe today that he was sent to his friends, he did this with a shipping permit from the Quebec Liquor Commission.

Some of the friends he said shipped to were Senator Jacques Bureau, former Minister of Customs, R. Farrow, Deputy Minister of Customs, Clarence Jamieson, and L. A. Laroche, members of the Civil Service Commission.

Inspector Duncan's Report
OTTAWA, Ont., April 27.—The confidential report of Inspector Walter Duncan, which has been before the Customs Probe Committee for some weeks, was made public this morning.

Chairman Macleod announced at the outset of this morning's proceedings that the committee had decided unanimously that the report be read.

Hon. G. H. Bolvin, Minister of Customs, said that the report had not been placed before the country. Persons sitting directly in front of him in the report had been given a copy to refer to.

PACT CONFLICTS ANXIETY FOR WITH LEAGUE COVENANT FLYERS IS INCREASING

Art. 3 of Russo-German Treaty Conflicts With Art. 16 of L. of N. Covenant—Germany Will be Asked to Explain.

PARIS, April 27.—The Russo-German treaty received in official form this morning contains an unfavorable expression. The Foreign Office experts will carefully examine the text before any decision is taken as to what steps may be necessary.

It is said that Germany is likely to be asked to explain the present conflict between the terms of the treaty and article 16 of the League of Nations covenant before she is admitted to the League in September. The Allied chancelleries are busy studying the text of the treaty and as soon as it is fully digested changes of views will be immediately initiated.

FINE MISSION MEETING HELD LAST NIGHT

Third Service in Trinity Church Largely Attended.

"THE SATISFYING PORTION"

Subject of an interesting address by Capt. Tom Best.

Capt. Best's third service in Trinity United Church was largely attended. A fifteen minute song service was conducted by Mr. Lloyd with Prof. W. E. Fletcher at the organ.

Rev. Dr. Ramsay and Mr. West led the meeting in prayer.

A very pleasing duet "Looking this way" was rendered by Mrs. W. E. Fletcher and Mr. Lloyd.

Adj. Davis read the announcements, telling of the various prayer meetings that were being held in connection with the mission.

Isaiah 55 first two verses was read. Capt. Best's scripture reading and his theme was "The satisfying portion." Capt. Best called his hearers to listen to Matt 5: where it is told how God supplies everything.

They are satisfied with what we get? The speaker told how hard athletes had to work to become champions and outlined his personal experiences as a mile runner and how for four long years he had to train and work hard to win the Canadian championship for the mile run.

His one desire had been to become a champion, after attaining it the blaze of glory and the adour of the people soon cooled off and he found that he still had to work for a living.

Riches was dealt with by the speaker by appointing a commission to "stamp out birth control propaganda."

In installing the commission, Luigi Federzoni, Minister of the Interior, said: "Italy considers the multiplication of births her maximum wealth and the most powerful instrument of her indisputable expansion in the world."

Mr. Best told how it was the small houses that were the real homes and were more happy than the families in the large mansions and palaces. When you get what you want will you want it? Was the quotation used by Capt. Best when referring to ambitions realized after a hard struggle. Power costs us a lot, far more than we expected and often proves unsatisfactory.

Pleasure Seekers.—People both young and old realize that it is not worth while this great and everlasting seeking after pleasure and find that unless they seek the right kind of pleasure it is always unsatisfactory.

Mr. Best had a short message to the men telling them of the sting that is in some of the pleasure they are seeking today in wrong living and the after consequences of youthful folly.

God cares for those who trust Him, those who trust the Lord want for no good thing. And lastly no real pleasure comes our lives until Jesus comes into our hearts.

Capt. Best had visited hundreds of dying men and never saw one yet that regretted, that Jesus came into his life.
