Prime Minister Receives Warm Prince Co. Welcome

Prime Minister St. Laurent and his party, J. Lester Douglas, P. R. McCormac, president of the Queen's County Liberal Association, C. A. Miller and Hon. F. A. Large arrived at the R. C. A. F. station, Summerside, at 2:15 yesterday afternoon from Rustico where they had partaken of a lobster luncheon at noon.

Following an inspection of a guard of honor formed at the entrance to the port the Prime Minister addressed the air force personnel formation on the parade grounds. He paid high tribute to the officers and men of the station and assured them that they were "part of something devised to prevent another war."

At Wellington—There was a large assembly of the townspeople at Wellington to honor to the Prime Minister on his arrival. The main street was gaily bedecked with flags and bunting and fire sirens were set off.

Members of the delegation expressed themselves strongly on the events prior to yesterday morning's meeting with the Prime Minister at the Charlottetown. Although they had been assured by Mr. J. Lester Douglas that the meeting had been arranged with the Prime Minister's secretary in Halifax on Sunday night, it became evident that they were not going to get an interview.

Mr. Douglas was approached and eventually the Prime Minister met the delegation some three-quarters of an hour after the stated time. It was reported by members of the delegation that Mr. MacNaught, who was familiar with the fishing problems as Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Fisheries, had left the hotel and was not present during the interview.

Expressing his appreciation of the privilege of meeting the leaders of the business men in Summerside, Mr. St. Laurent said that he had hoped for a long time to get down here to the Cradle of Confederation. "Especially," he went on "since the entry of Newfoundland into confederation."

During the interview the Prime Minister was seen to articulate energetically in the centre of the delegation and a stand-up-and-knocked-out battle of words ensued. Warned that he was already five minutes behind schedule, Mr. St. Laurent, flushed and excited, moved to leave but the delegation remained firm and pressed their points home.
