DEATH AT LEWES.—The death occurred at Lewes, Lot 60, on March 10th instant, of Margaret, relict of the late Mr. Duncan M. MacLean, Elder. She was born in the Isle of Skye, Scotland, seventy-three years ago and emigrated to this country in 1854. She was married in 1863 and since that time resided in Lewes where she reared her family and devoted herself to the community by her kind disposition and gentle Christian character. She leaves to mourn two sons and three daughters. These are: George, on the homestead, John A. in Vancouver, Mrs. John A. MacPherson, Lewes; Mrs. Donald J. MacPherson, Oakland, Cal., and Mrs. David J. Bull, Murray Harbor. These have the sympathy of a wide circle of friends in their bereavement.

TWO SAD DEATHS.—Two children died in Charlottetown on Thursday from diphtheria. Both were seven years of age and had been schoolmates together. One child was little Richard Worth, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Worth, Hillsboro St. He had been ill for several days. He seemed to be about recovered from the terrible malady when he contracted the disease and died quite suddenly. The funeral took place privately in the afternoon to the Peoples' Cemetery. The other victim of this dread disease was little Marion E. Taylor, second daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Taylor, Fitzroy St., formerly of St. Peter's Island. The funeral took place yesterday morning by iceboat to Rocky Point thence to New Dominion Cemetery. The case of these two children is particularly sad indeed. Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved parents.

WEDDING BELLS.—At Sea View, Queen's Co, a quiet wedding was celebrated on Wednesday evening of this week, the contracting parties being Miss Dora M. Donald of Sea View and Mr. John J. Brown of Cranville. The ceremony was performed by Rev. E. J. Rattae, Malpeque in the presence of a number of the immediate relatives of the contracting parties. Promptly at 7 o'clock the bride entered the parlor leaning upon the arm of her uncle, Mr. John C. Donald, and the uniting words were soon spoken. After the wedding supper, a very orderly and well-behaved crowd of charivari men arrived and their conduct certainly deserves to be highly spoken of; they saluted the bride and groom, gave them three hearty cheers and then as they retired, sang a sereading song in splendid voice and expressive of fine sentiment. Such a visit makes the old custom a source of great pleasure and not of annoyance.

Mr. Adam Brown, chairman of the evening meeting at New Glasgow on Wednesday, when over 100 men and women gathered to learn of the new work, on behalf of those present, tendered Mrs. Dunbrack a hearty vote of thanks for her able address.

Vital Statistics Public Notice

By an Act of the Legislature of 1910 and amended in 1912, Births occurring in Prince Edward Island must be registered within thirty (30) days of their occurrence and Deaths within seven (7) days, with the District Registrar, who is also Road-master for the district.

The duty of reporting to the District Registrar falls upon the parents or other members of the family. The physician in attendance must certify to the cause of death.

The penalty in each case is a fine of from \$1.00 to \$20.00 and costs
