

DALE ARRIVAL OF ROYAL PARTY.

QUEBEC, August 23.—It is not now expected that the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall can reach Quebec on September 18th, the date scheduled. In order to reach Quebec on time the Ophir would have to travel at the rate of 30 knots per hour, and even if the Ophir were cabled of attaining this high rate of speed she could not be pushed for such a distance. It is therefore believed that the royal party will not reach Quebec before September 22nd.

BAPTISTS IN SESSION

The Fifty-Sixth Annual Convention.

OUR REPRESENTATIVE

Present and Sends the following Account of Proceedings.

The first meeting of the fifty sixth session of Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces opened under very auspicious circumstances Saturday morning at 10 o'clock, the beautiful weather the large number of delegates in attendance giving promise of a most agreeable and harmonious session.

The beautiful and commodious church home of the first Baptist church was the meeting place of the session and in its rich decoration dress looked its best. The choir gallery was draped with flags and bunting, while on the platform and pulpit stand blooming begonias, trailing ivies and bright hued foliage vying with an array of many colored asters and other out flowers.

At 10 o'clock the chair was taken by C. E. Roscoe M. A. President of the convention and after the usual devotional exercises and reading of the rules of order the fifty sixth session of the Maritime Convention of Baptists was duly declared open and ready for business.

These visitors having been introduced to the Convention were welcomed by the President and after each had spoken a few kindly words of greeting took their seats.

From Rev. G. J. Coulter White, resigning his position on the Board of Governors of Acadia University, on account of removal from the Provinces. On motion resignation was accepted and Rev. S. B. Kempton was elected to fill vacancy caused by such removal.

An invitation for the Maritime Convention to hold its next session (1902) in Yarmouth, N. S. This invitation was on motion accepted with thanks.

Notice to the effect that the National Baptist Convention would hold its next annual session in the Maritime Provinces in 1902.

An invitation from the Y. M. C. A. of Moncton welcoming the Convention to the city and inviting them to the free use of their Reading room during their stay. Invitation accepted with thanks.

The committee on arrangements reported through its Chairman, recommending the Provisional program as prepared, subject to slight change in the matter of time of meetings.

LECTURE IN TRYON

Delivered by Mr. Myers on Foreign Missions.

A RUN-AWAY ACCIDENT.

The Driver Thrown out and the Carriage Badly Damaged.

Mr. Dockendorff of North River recently purchased a fine specimen of the equine genus from Mr. A. Gamble for a handsome sum. This animal was formerly owned by our butter maker, Mr. Frank Lang. A few light showers have checked the harvest operations, but they will do incalculable good to the pastures and root crops. Miss Emily Wood has been visiting friends in Summerside and the West.

A runaway accident occurred to our Boston friend Mr. John Crossman on Thursday night. While indulging in a pleasure drive with his young and stylish pony recently secured from Mr. McDonald of Summerside, the animal took fright and raced furiously, soon becoming uncontrollable. Mr. Crossman was thrown from his buggy, but this did by no means check the speed of the horse. He was at length stopped before he did much harm. This gentleman, though badly shaken up, is now looking as well as ever, only his pocket relieved of a few surplus green backs in repairing damages.

Mr. and Mr. Wm. Dockendorff of North River are enjoying a few pleasant days visiting in Tryon and vicinity.

It grieves us to note that Mr. A. Campbell, who has been sick for some time, is now lying at the point of death.

On Thursday evening Mr. Myers gave a lecture in the Presbyterian Church at Tryon, on foreign mission work. He is a young man and a college graduate, and those who had the pleasure of hearing him will not soon forget his address. As an introduction to his lecture he read portions of Acts 1st chapter, and Daniel 4th chapter. He thus presented to our minds the two pictures: Christ on Mount Olivet giving his solemn, dying charge to his disciples to preach the gospel "unto the uttermost parts of the earth," this the beginning of mission work, and the other of Christ on his judgment throne summing up the fruits of their labors as the end of it. He then outlined the missionary work as done by the Presbyterians of the Maritime Provinces, using maps to show the different mission stations. He referred to the first missionary sent to heathen lands, the Rev. John Geddy, who in 1848 left the shores of this our fair Isle of the sea, and landed on the shores of one of the New Hebrides Islands. The inhabitants of this Island were at that time among the lowest and most degraded type of men. But this Island, through the labors of Mr. Geddy, has been brought from its then state of idolatry and cannibalism into the glorious light and liberty of the gospel. He made touching reference to Mr. Gordon, another of P. E. Island's sons, who labored in another of the New Hebrides Islands. He showed the axe by which this man was slain by a native and told how his brother volunteered to go and was sent to fill the vacant place. He also described the work as done in Korea and Trinidad. His lecture was an able presentation of the claims of foreign missions, and he completely destroyed the narrow-minded view of those who say we have heathen at home and need the money and men to convert them before we try the foreign field. True we have heathen enough at home, but will we withhold the gospel from those hungering and thirsting for the bread and water of life, to give it to those who trample on the Word of God? Any reproduction of this lecture would fall far short of the original, none especially this one.

THE CHINESE PORTS.

PEKIN, August 24.—The omission from the peace settlement protocol of a provision for the destruction of the Chinese forts was due chiefly to Li Hung Chang's protests. He represented that it would be a disgrace to himself, who had built the forts, to sign an agreement for their destruction. Moreover, he might be punished therefor. The omission in no wise affects their destruction, which will be carried out on the ground of military necessity. The clerical work of preparing copies of the protocol is likely to delay the signing for a few days.

SIR CHARLES DISAPPOINTED.

MONTREAL, August 23.—Sir Charles Tupper arrived here to-day and will sail for England in the morning, accompanied by Lady Tupper. Sir Charles expressed himself to-day as being disappointed with the result of the census. He believed the population would be six millions.

ENGLISH ENGINES FAIL

KINGSTON, Jamaica, August 22.—Another heavy test of the respective merits of English and American locomotives on the railroads here has resulted in a great victory for the latter, which drew 128 tons over the heaviest part of the line in seven minutes under the schedule time. The English locomotive completely failed to pull the same load, and when materially lightened failed to make even regular time.
