Charles S. Minard and Miss Josephine Steele were quietly married Sunday, February 2, at St. Mary's church, Lynn, Mass., in the presence of a few friends. The bride is a daughter of John Steele, Summerside, and has been residing in Lynn for the past three years. The Guardian joins in good wishes.

A gentleman who lives some fifteen miles from Summerside visits the Guardian complaining of the condition of the road from Summerside to Bead's corner. His complaint is based on the fact that this piece of road is usually bad and he concludes with this specific charge: He drove into Summerside last Sunday night on account of the snowstorm, which began Sunday evening and continued during Monday. He did not leave for home until Tuesday at 10 o'clock a.m. thinking that by that time the roads would be broken. Imagine his surprise when he found even at that late hour and on a fine day that no attempt had been made to break the roads, that there was not even a trace of any kind. By tramping the road before him he managed to get through and he came to an insupportable drift some distance beyond Mr. Lefurgy's. Here he was obliged to return as there was a barb wire fence on each side of him, until he found a fence that he could break through. By devious courses around barnyards, through fields and over fences he made his way through to Travellers Rest where he found the roads well broken, as they were all the rest of the way home. His experience was shared by two other gentlemen who on Monday evening drove from Sea View to S'Side, finding no difficulty until they came to Bead's corner. Here they too were obliged to break down fences, drive through barnyards and tramp the road as best they could till they reached S'Side, exhausted and with their horses injured. This is an old complaint. This road especially in winter has been neglected most shamefully and the time has come for the business men of Summerside to take some definite action in the matter. The reputation of the road has become such that no one from the country will attempt to come to town until days after a storm. If the overseer in charge of this section persists in the negligence and indifference he has shown for so many years he must be taught what the duties and responsibilities of an overseer are. The closing sentence in the indignant protest made by the gentleman who made his complaint to the Guardian is a significant one and may be taken as a warning. Here it is: "Had I known to day who the overseer is I would certainly have had him fired." This is what will happen if there is any further cause for complaint.

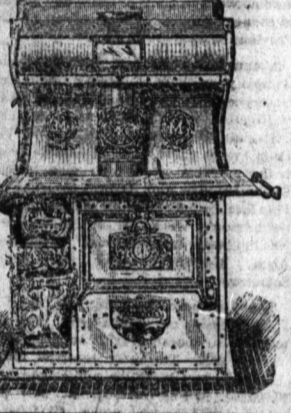
