CANNOT ACT AS SOLICITOR

LONDON, July 3.—A woman, as the English law stands at present, cannot act as a solicitor. She can, however, according to a statement made in the Law Courts today, act as queen, marshal, churchwarden, constable, workhouse governor, returning officer or overseer of the poor. Stanley O. Buckmaster, K. C., also stated that there were instances of women acting as keepers of prisons, and the offices of jailer had, he said, apparently been common among women. It was also recorded in books that Anne Countess of Pembroke, from the Law Society a declaration of Assizes with the judges on the Bench, and, although it was not said that she administered justice, that was a solicitor.

The foregoing list of women's activities was given at the hearing in the Chancery Division of an action brought by Miss Gwyneth Marjorie Bebb with the object of obtaining from the Law Society a declaration that she is a "person" within the meaning of the Solicitors' Act, and is entitled to be admitted to act as a solicitor.
