### Big changes in Children's and Women's wear

New "Victory" Clothes Not Expected in Shops Until Fall.

MONTREAL, March 24—(CP)—Sweeping changes in women's and children's wear, designed to conserve supplies of materials but to interfere as little as possible with style, were announced today by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board.

J. A. Klein, the board's administrator of women's, misses' and children's wear, said that the order strikes at "cloth over cloth," or the manufacture of jackets, coats, hoodies, capes and such items as additional attachments to dresses and other forms of clothing.

Though the order becomes effective immediately its application to spring and summer style goods will not start until June 1. Thus manufacturers presently producing spring and summer lines will be allowed to continue such production until that date. This means that the new "victory" clothes will not be seen in shops until the fall.

Mr. Klein said that the order was designed to "prevent the depletion of a very vital supply situation." He added that there was no immediate shortage of supply and normal buying by Canadian women would help make it possible to "clothe everyone indefinitely."

The order limits the hems and sweeps of all styles of garments. It rules out bodices attached to skirts and blouses, and replaces them with waist bands. It limits the sizes of belts and restricts to nine the number of buttons that may be used on any one dress. Making underslips and bell sleeves are "out" and each dress may have only one zipper with a maximum length of nine inches in daytime dress and 12 inches in evening dress.

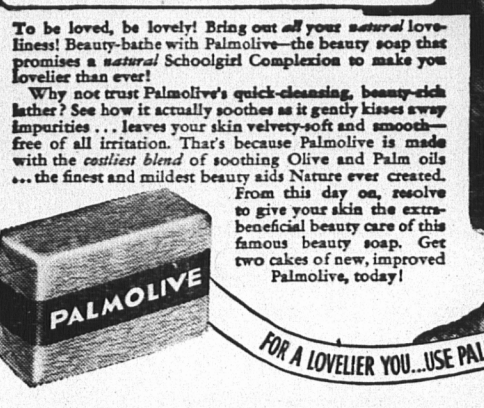

### Italian Battleship

"From short reports so far received it appears that our forces destroyed the enemy's battleship and determined daylight torpedo attack on the strong enemy forces and one Italian battleship was seen to be hit by at least one torpedo.

"The arrival of the convoy at Malta was delayed by a sudden fierce gale which sprang up thus giving the enemy air forces opportunity to carry out a series of heavy air attacks on the convoy during March 23.

"The worst that the enemy could do, however, did not prevent most important supplies from reaching Malta.

The hero of the battle was Rear-Admiral P. L. Vian, commander of the protecting force, who as captain of the destroyer Cassik cornered the German prison ship Amark in a Norwegian fiord in 1940 and rescued 307 British prisoners.

During the year there were 358 investigations under the criminal code with 140 convictions. At the same time there were 1,763 investigations under the provincial statutes with 426 convictions.

The Police Inspector reported 41 sudden or accidental deaths investigated, eight of which were highway fatalities, nine the result of aeroplane crashes; six drownings, two suicides and 16 from other causes.

Investigations under the prohibition act amounted to 454 which resulted in 234 seizures, 95 more than the previous year. In addition there were 773 searches which were described as "non-resistant." There were 256 convictions with total fines imposed amounting to \$11,769 and 1,230 hours of imprisonment.

Excise act investigations numbered 463 with 106 convictions. At the end of 1941 the Mounted Police in this province totalled 39, an increase of nine during the year. They included three special constables, one permanent and one temporary civil servant.

Hon. Mr. Wright, Mr. McIsaac, and Mr. J. W. Boulter in the capacity of technical advisor, was adopted.

Premier Campbell said he had been in communication with Hon. Col. Ralston on this matter. Col. Ralston replied by wire acknowledging receipt of the resolution passed by the Legislature on March 20, and suggesting that the matter would be presented much more effectively by representatives of the potato growers in Prince Edward Island who have first-hand knowledge of production and other factors affecting the industry. If such representation comes to Ottawa, Col. Ralston would be pleased to meet them and arrange a meeting with the Wartime Prices and Trade Board so that the representations could be fully considered. Other members from Prince Edward Island had also promised their co-operation.

Mr. MacFie said the Federation of Agriculture was desirous of having representation on the delegation, and the names of Mr. W. R. Shaw and Mr. Boulter had been suggested in this regard. Mr. Linklater suggested that a "good long letter" would serve the purpose instead of a delegation.

Hon. Mr. Dennis said he did not think Mr. Shaw would be able to go in any case. He recommended instead Mr. J. J. Trainor.

Mr. Baker said he was surprised at this suggestion. He was afraid the Department of Agriculture was "getting a little out of hand."

Mr. Hughes said he was opposed to the motion.

Dr. MacMillan's motion was put, and defeated by the Government members and a majority of their supporters.

At 1:30 p.m. the House adjourned to meet at 3 o'clock Wednesday afternoon.
