Shuns Contracts—Will Help Defend Davis Cup in International Competition.

"I'm entirely at the disposal of the British Lawn Tennis Association," he said. "As to the engagement," he said, "that's off, but I'm going to give Miss Lawson a sales talk as soon as I get home."

"I've waited too long to get it to give it up so soon. I think it's my duty as an Englishman to help defend it again. Then Tennis Association has been very good to me. Five years ago, when I couldn't hit anything, they started sending me over here. The least I can give them is loyalty. And besides, this is the King's Jubilee year."
