The Souris market prices yesterday were the same as when last quoted, viz: butter 20 to 22 cts; eggs 15 cts; pork, 7 1/2 to 8 1/2 cts; white oats, 36 cts; black oats, 38 cts; potatoes 45 to 50 cts; beef, 8 to 10 cts; hides, 4 cts; calf skins, 10 cts; loose hay, \$10 and pressed hay \$11 per ton; dry codfish, 6 cts per lb.; hake, 4 cts per lb.; fresh herring, 15 cts and clams 20 cts per bucket.

Yesterday's work in Legislature (Continued from page 9) declared lost by 14 to 13. Mr. Mathieson, Mr. McLean, the Premier, Hon. Mr. Hughes, and others continued the discussion, in the course of which the Premier referred to a "fair statement" in The Guardian that the Government had shown promptness in supplying information and returns, while Hon. Mr. Hughes charged that the Government was inspired by the Opposition, and quite unfair. Mr. Arsenault hoped that in future the papers would give more space to reporting Mr. Hughes.

Afternoon Session. The House resumed its session and went into Committee of supply with Mr. McWilliams in the chair at 3:45. Mr. Arsenault resumed the discussion on the point of order raised last evening and was followed by Mr. McKinnon at some length. Mr. Kennedy (Bradabane) who discussed some asylum accounts, and Mr. Prowse, who remarked upon the Opposition being called "fools" and "fellows" from the other side. Hon. L. McDonald told a

story which ended with the remark "You ought to be in the Asylum yourself." Mr. Dewar followed, criticising the words of speakers on the other side and the growing expenditures. Hon. B. Gallant defended the purchase of supplies for the asylum and the language used by the Premier last night. Hon. Mr. CUMMISKEY spoke at some length explaining the coal purchases and created some amusement by citing what he thought to be unparliamentary language by the Opposition. MR. KENNEDY, Kensington again recited the occurrences of last night which culminated in disorder. The discussion was continued by Hon. L. McDonald and Mr. Dewar, who left nearly five o'clock when the asylum estimates were passed and the deadlock broken. The next item taken up was interest \$37,930. The Premier explained showing the amounts paid respectively to the banks on loans, debentures, etc. Mr. Mathieson commented on the increased interest paid to banks and thought the rate, 5 per cent was too high for the Government to pay, while the money the Government left on deposit in the banks produced but 3 per cent. The Premier explained that they were not lending money to the banks and only comparatively small amounts were left on deposit receipt at the lower rate. The matter was further discussed by Mr. Arsenault and Mr. Prowse, who read a tabular statement showing the large increase in interest account under Liberal rule. He was followed by Mr. Dewar, Mr. Mathieson, and Mr. Dobie, when the item passed.

The next item, Legislature, \$9,900, covers the payment to members, and was passed almost without discussion. A number of miscellaneous votes amounting to \$6,555 were included in the next vote. These include the Telephone Company subsidy, \$800; R. Association \$100, Queen Square Gardens \$250, Deaf and Dumb, Halifax, \$2,010, Fire Department, city \$650, Ditto, Summerside \$150, Mr. Whelan, pension \$325, F. W. Hughes, retiring allowance \$300, Pension for the Blind, Halifax \$960, Prevention of Tuberculosis \$600, Children's Protection Home \$500, Dr. Anderson's retiring allowance \$200 per annum. There was considerable discussion in regard to the grant or prevention of tuberculosis in which a number of members expressed their sense of the importance of the work and their regret that the amount could not be increased. There was also some remark in regard to the proposed increase of \$200 per annum to Dr. Anderson. All on both sides expressed their sense of his eminent services and that he is well deserving of recognition in this way. A number of speakers referred to a current remark that he had not received an allowance from the Carnegie Fund and did not really need the pension nearly so much as some half dozen aged teachers who are left in their old age some of them with no better prospect than a final refuge in the Infirmary. Mr. Arsenault urged the House to consider the case of these old teachers and to "do it now." The consensus of opinion however, quite authorized the allowance to Dr. Anderson, with the hope that something might be done at no distant date for aged and infirm teachers, who as Mr. Irving expressed it "need the means to live." The discussion continued till 6 o'clock. The resolution was agreed to.

Evening Session. The House resumed its sitting at 8:20 o'clock and committee of supply was resumed, the first item being Miscellaneous Expenditure, \$1,200. Objection was taken by Mr. Mathieson that last year, with the same amount voted there was \$3,714 expended.

He sharply criticized certain items including \$460 paid for advertising in the Standard of Empire, the expenses of Hon. Mr. Richards' trip to Ottawa \$30 and so on. The Premier thought that this year \$1200 would be sufficient, but there were frequently unforeseen outlays. Mr. Mathieson said that if the Tax Adjusters had been paid what was coming to them for the total of \$1200 must be already expended. The Premier said he would supply further information and the item stood over. Paupers, Legislative grant \$2,000, Executive Council grant \$1,000 was next taken up and passed. The Infirmary \$5,000. There were 22 inmates on 20th September last. Passed. Postage and rent of P. O. Boxes \$500 passed. Salaries and expenses of Public Lands Department, \$6,150 came next and brought out a sharp criticism from Mr. Mathieson of the large number of extra clerks employed in the Registry Office to assist the work of the Adjusters. He declared this money was wasted, and was expended without authority. The money had not been foreseen that the expenditure would be so large, but had not been excessive in view of the work done. No money had been wasted. MR. MATHIESON made an extended review of the work of readjusting land values which he contended was badly done, there being excessive valuations. He stated that the land sold for much less than the assessed valuation. There were over 600 appeals, and great dissatisfaction among hundreds who did not appeal. He charged that the Premier had told Hon. MR. ARSENULT that if they were dissatisfied they should state their case to the Government and it would be made right, although the Government had no authority to do anything of the kind. MR. ARSENULT enforced this latter contention stating that 253 valuations had been reduced by the Adjusters after their first awards had been made. MR. McDONALD, Cardigan, instanced a case of undervaluation where a proper assessment was raised from \$500 to \$700, although he stated it is now worth \$3,000. The criticism of the valuation was continued by Mr. Delaney and Mr. Dobie on the Opposition side. Hon. MR. ARSENULT thought the Adjusters did their work very well. Assessment for purposes of taxation was a very difficult task the world over. The Adjusters were men of standing and good judgment, and were instructed to make a fair valuation. There were few cases in which they had revised their first estimate as they had a perfect right to do. He did not believe it was necessary for them to visit each man's farm. Besides that he had the valuation which the owner had before made, which MR. McLEAN told of having sold a farm ten or twelve years ago for \$2,200, which had since been greatly increased in value and was now valued at \$2,400. The Adjuster himself being the owner, and stated several other instances of valuation which were far out of the way. He did not think the assessment is any better than it was before. He found there was much dissatisfaction. Hon. MR. McDONALD, after further Opposition speeches, defended the valuation and read from the law a section which he contended gave full power to revise and correct the valuation first made. MR. McKINNON was not disappointed with the work of the Adjusters considering the difficulty of the work, the instructions given them and the time to which they were limited. The trustees in many cases did not and would not assist them, because the ratepayers did not want them to do so. The result is that the assessment is little better than before. There are quite a number valued too high, but generally speaking he thought the lands are not yet assessed at quite their full value. The item then passed. Provincial Auditor's Department \$1,500 passed without discussion, also Provincial Building \$3,400, Registry Office, Charlottetown, \$3,100 and Registry Office, Summerside, \$1,900. Also Stenographer and Librarian.

At this stage progress was reported and the House adjourned till tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock the understanding being that there shall be an all-day sitting. NOTE. By a mechanical error in the make up of the report of proceedings in the Legislature published in The Guardian of Friday morning some three lines of Mr. Mathieson's speech in regard to the John River school marks of the Premier in regard to pensions for aged teachers. The error is corrected in today's magazine section where the Legislative report for the week is reproduced. What was said by Mr. Mathieson should read as follows: "MR. MATHIESON said the Government did not pay the amount, \$359, in the Johnson River school case until April, 1910, and that it has been reported that the money had been before that raised by the proceeds of a note of which Mr. Cummiskey was the endorser." etc. What the Premier said, which was mixed with the above, should read: "THE PREMIER agreed with the principle laid down by the previous speakers and hoped the time would come when something could be done to meet these cases."
