SUM'SIDE AND WEST

AMONG the shipments by the Northumberland yesterday were two hundred barrels oysters, one car of wheat and a large quantity of pork.

It has been officially announced that the S. S. Stanley will be placed on the Summerside-Cape Tormentine route during the coming winter.

Messrs. Tremain Lea and Edward Lea of West Somerville, Mass., arrived in Summerside by the Northumberland Monday night and will spend a week or two visiting in their native Province.

Mr. S. H. JONES made his last shipment of sheep numbering 175 by the Northumberland yesterday morning. This totals 12,800 head of sheep shipped by Mr. Jones this season. Besides these 8,000 live geese.

THE following telegram was received by Hon. R. C. McLeod yesterday evening.

OTTAWA, Nov. 19.

R. C. McLEOD.—Have given instructions to place Stanley on Summerside-Tormentine route as requested. We desire to make an earnest effort to ascertain the practicability of this route.

Signed JAMES SUTHERLAND, (Acting Minister of Marine and Fisheries)

That the Marine Department has ordered the steamer Stanley to be placed on the Summerside route during the coming winter will be appreciated by the majority of the people of this province, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and many people living in foreign parts. For many years this route has been advocated through the press and by members in the House of Commons. Efforts have been made from time to time to have the winter boat ply between these two points, but owing to the stronger pull at the other end of the province and in Pictou County the matter never seemed to have much weight with the powers at Ottawa. By persistent agitation on the part of the Summerside Board of Trade, organized in 1900, a promise was received, from the Minister of Marine and Fisheries Sir L. H. Davies, that a trial would be made last winter. This was done in part by owing to reasons partly uncontrollable partly because of lack of timely preparation of the means of terminal facilities and partly because of interest at the other end being strongly against this route, the trial was nipped in the bud. It took a good deal of effort during the past few months to have the powers that be grant the request to have another fair trial made this coming winter, and it was only through the unrelenting efforts of the leading members of the Board of Trade that we have the wishes of the people complied with. The feasibility of the route is beyond question, under ordinary conditions, and only a few remaining obstacles are visible: through freight and passenger rates and a warehouse for the accommodation of freight at the Cape. These are forthcoming, and with these matters in view a delegation left by the tug Frank C. Batt yesterday to visit Cape Tormentine and Sackville, riding over the N. B. and P. E. I. railway, to study the conditions on the mainland in connection with the proposed means of communication. All will hope for a successful trip and look forward to better accommodations for freight and passenger traffic during the winter season than has heretofore been experienced. If the whole province will unite in judging this new route in all fairness the public may look for a much improved winter communication with the outside world. As has been said time and again the establishment of the Summerside-Tormentine route will be a great benefit to the Province generally for all time to come; and the uncertainty of crossing in winter will eventually be a thing of the past. It is now long past the time since this should have been brought about, but it is better late than never, and future generations may look back upon the first year of the twentieth century as the crowning era in a long talked of and, it might be said, bitterly agitated for public improvement.

IN the Queen Square Church Sunday evening, says the St. John Telegraph, Rev. R. W. Weddall preached, before a large congregation, on "our duty in the present smallpox crisis." He based his sermon upon the 91st Psalm. He showed that the encouragement to be derived from this beautiful Hebrew ode, which was written in a time of peril, was open only to those in the closest touch with God. He encouraged his hearers to pray for deliverance from the present danger but warned them against developing a species of religious fanaticism to the neglect of the proper sanitary measure. God worked through the instrumentality of human intelligence and Christians should use every possible precaution against the spread of the disease. Vaccination had been demonstrated one of the best of these precautions and he commended the Board of Health for making vaccination compulsory. Those who refused to submit to the operation could not be recognized as the friends of public safety and no condemnatory language, he said, was to be used for those who make their escape from both quarantine and vaccination, having been exposed to infection. "Let the Board of Health," said the rev. gentleman, impressively, "use every endeavor to correct the blunder for which someone is responsible and by which disease first entered the city, and by the enforcement of suitable quarantine and the adoption of proper cleanliness, both of sewerage and streets—in which undertaking they should be aided by all loyal citizens—stamp out the disease." In conclusion he pointed out that these were reasons why the Lord had permitted the calamity. The apostles knew where He had permitted evil to exist in order to avert a greater evil. Consolation in the present trouble as in all times of trouble should be sought from the word of God and we should turn to it.
