Christmas Travel Increases Daily

MONCTON, N.B., Dec. 18—(CP)—The rush of Christmas travel will commence in earnest in the Maritime Provinces tomorrow, Wednesday with the first closing of Colleges and Universities in these provinces, according to R.S.J. Weatherston, general freight and passenger agent of the Canadian National Railways here.

There has been considerable Christmas travel to date made up mostly of passengers bound to the ports of Halifax and Saint John to embark on ocean liners for overseas.

Extra equipment will be pressed into service and special train services have been arranged to take care of the travel.

From now right up until Christmas Eve the travel is expected to be very heavy with students returning to their homes not only in the Maritime Provinces, but Upper Canada centres and with passengers from these centres returning to spend the Christmas holidays with the home folks. In addition there will be a considerable travel within the Maritimes. Special low Christmas and New Year's fares have been put into effect by Canadian Railways with generous return limits and it is expected there will give a considerable stimulus to the holiday travel.

PLACENTIA NOW BUSIEST PLACE
ST. JOHN'S Nfld., Dec. 18—(CP)—"Without doubt the busiest place in Newfoundland today is Placentia," declared J. T. Chessman of the department of Natural Resources. "Everybody seems to work can work and it is expected there will be brought in to Placentia from points as far away as Branch".

Ship-building is progressing rapidly under the Commission Government's scheme. Seven schooner are being built at Placentia at present, the government official said. Two will be 70-ton craft, the other five smaller.

EVANSTON, Ill., Dec. 18—University co-eds are dumb—just like foxes.

Timidly they display a flash of intelligence to their escorts, but then they endeavor by every means to convince the boys that they are mentally superior to women."

FINN WOMEN GOOD WITH TAX-DOGGER
LONDON, Dec. 18—The woman income tax inspector is now making her appearance in London after being "tried out" by Somerset House in the provinces.

The first woman inspector is Miss M. W. Barnham, and soon she will be joined by another in the inspector's chair a university woman who will discuss with him the most intricate problems of income tax law and his investments in stocks and shares.

Somerset House finds that women have some special aptitude as tax gatherers, and is rapidly increasing their numbers, but there is still some difficulty about the proper form of address. The other day one astonished caller gasped: "Are you the gentleman I came to see?"

Women inspectors have been addressed as "Madam," "Miss," or "Miss Inspector," and by ingratiating taxpayers of their own sex as "Dear."

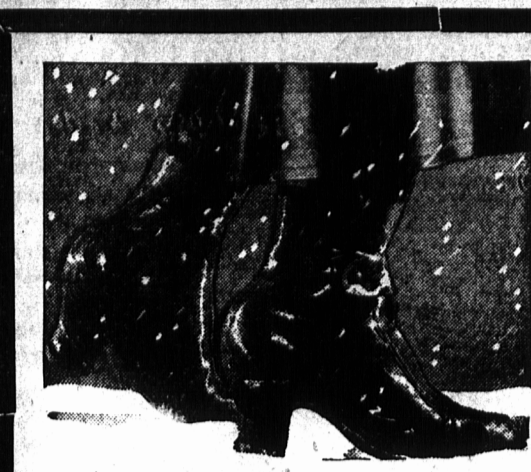
500,000 PEOPLE ILL IN MALARIA EPIDEMIC
LONDON, Dec. 18—A rapidly spreading epidemic of malaria in Ceylon was estimated today to have affected 500,000 people, according to despatches from Colombo to the Colonial Office here.

The Governor of Ceylon reported extensive relief measures were under way in 68 Government hospitals, 247 dispensaries and 139 centres for temporary treatment.

The epidemic started in October and continued to spread, surpassing all records malaria outbreaks in Ceylon.

WOMEN'S RIGHTS MAKING HEADWAY

MONTEBELLO, Dec. 18—The laws concerning women in the province of Quebec are still very antiquated despite some few improvements that have been won by the efforts of women's organizations, said Mrs. Leslie Bell, address secretary of the Conservative association here. Mrs. Bell is a member of the Nova Scotia Bar but is not permitted by the laws of Quebec to practice her profession here.

"Married women in Quebec are classed in law with minors and lunatics and thus have little control over their property," the speaker said. "It seems to be the idea of our legislators that once a woman is married, she becomes incapable of looking after her own property." Mrs. Bell spoke of the importance of having a contract drawn before marriage, as it could not be made afterwards. Even with a contract, she said, the wife was

"DEVIL WAGON" AROUSED FEAR 30 YEARS AGO

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Dec. 18—How fast an automobile had to travel 30 years ago to attain furious speed is not disclosed in the following paragraphs from a Saint John newspaper of November 16, 1904, but at least one driver here was considered a menace in the early days of motoring.

A new peril has evidently appeared to menace the lives of citizens and one more deadly than the runaway horse. Last evening between 8 and 9 o'clock those who were walking along Dock Street were startled by the sight of an automobile dashing along at a furious rate of speed. There was no stopping at the crossings, and the lives of at least two men were almost sacrificed to the insane driving of those in the machine. The policeman on the beat tried to find out who they were but was glad to jump out of the way to save his life.

"It was a two-seated machine, made a great deal of noise, and carried two men. A number of citizens who watched the performance were highly indignant, and one who saw the 'devil wagon' almost knock a man down at the corner of Market Square and Dock Street complained to police, who tried to interfere with the result, stated. He held that every effort ought to be made to find out who was responsible for the scorching of last night and that punishment ought to be severe enough to protect the citizens against any recurrence of the outrage."

TRADING INCREASED ON TORONTO BOARD

TORONTO, Dec. 18—Volume of trading in industrial shares on the Toronto Stock Exchange expanded sharply in November, 692,263 shares changing hands as compared with 438,183 in October and 308,146 in September. The value of the transactions showed an even greater growth, the November total standing at \$12,780,713 against \$4,150,225 in October.

Preferred stocks figures in "increasing volume in the November returns and many of these issues moved to their peak prices for the year and helped to carry the Exchange index of 20 industrial stocks from 95.52 at the beginning of the month to 103.40 on the 15th.

The latter part of the month brought greater activity in the distillery stocks following the release of the alcohol export figures. The index closed the month at 100.01, up 4.49 from its opening. The trading list broadened out also in November, 199 issues appearing in the transactions, of which 121 showed advances, 43 declines, the others remaining unchanged.

KING GEORGE SPIKES MOVEMENT FOR A NEW YACHT
LONDON, Dec. 18—King George spiked a movement today to provide him with a new yacht by popular subscription in honor of the silver jubilee of his reign next year.

A spokesman for His Majesty said: "In the first place he is tremendously fond of the Britannia (present Royal yacht) and also feels that the £20,000 (about \$150,000) which would be required could better be applied to people out of work."
