The Institute of Science held its sixth monthly evening last evening in the Technical College, the chair being occupied by vice-president D. M. Ferguson. Three papers were read. The first was one by Lawrence W. Watson, M. A., of Charlottetown, on "The Geological Age of Prince Edward Island." The author referred to the various ideas that have been held by writers at different times as to the age of the rocks in that Province. For years it has been stated that triassic rocks occurred in the northern part, chiefly because of the finding of fossil remains of a reptile called "Bathygnathus borealis" at New London, and which was supposed to characterize the strata as Triassic. Dr. Dawson had held this view, which was reflected in all works on the subject. Recent investigations of the fossil in question has proved it to belong to another species which was extinct before triassic times, so that the conclusion now is that no rocks of that age exist in the island the whole rock system being referable to the permo-carboniferous age.—Halifax etc.

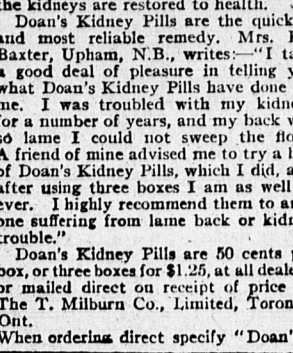

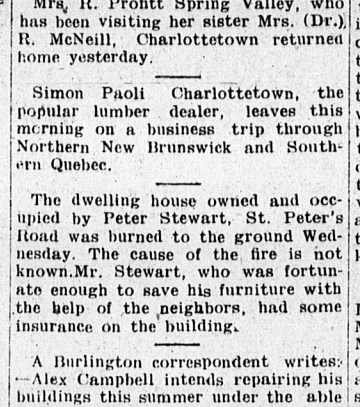
