

Government's Course Spells Disaster To The Province, Warns Hon. Dr. MacMillan

Secrecy Shrouding Campbell Administration's Financial Transactions And General Disregard Of Election Promises Scored By Former Conservative Premier.

The glaring contrast presented by the Campbell Government's actions in office with its promises when seeking support from the electors came in for scathing criticism at the hands of the Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, Provincial Conservative leader, at the annual meeting of the Queens County Conservative Association in the Strand Theatre last week.

"It is a great pleasure for me to stand here for a few moments and talk to the electors of Queens County," Dr. MacMillan said. "During the past summer I attended the annual conventions of the Prince County Conservative Association, both East and West Prince, and I found there the same enthusiasm as is evident here tonight.

"I have more admiration than ever for you, ladies and gentlemen, who have come to this annual meeting over roads that are no credit to any Province." (Applause).

"I quite approve of the resolution which you have passed, that the annual meeting of this Association should be held earlier, and I think it will be in the interests of the delegates from the country if it were held five or six weeks, or even two months earlier. I know that if conditions were favorable tonight this hall would be filled by enthusiastic Conservatives from this County. I regret more than I can say that weather conditions have been so bad that we have not every seat filled tonight, because later on you are going to hear one of the great Conservative leaders in the Dominion of Canada.

"I wish to thank you, Mr. President, for your very able presidential address in which you have reviewed the records of both the federal and provincial Conservative governments.

No Regrets

"I wish to acknowledge with sincere gratitude the resolution which you have passed, expressing confidence in the late federal and provincial administrations. I want to say that I do not regret to any great extent my defeat or the defeat of my government in this Province a year ago. Although I had the support of the finest colleagues and followers that any man could wish to have, yet we all had the same feeling, that if the Bennett Government was going to be defeated, we would sooner be defeated also and go down with the ship. That is what happened.

"When we went through the County in the provincial campaign we told the people the true story of the conditions in this province. I wish, instead of having fifteen minutes at my disposal tonight, that I had three or four hours, so that I could go into with you, the loyal supporters of the Conservative party, just what kind of campaign was carried on against us at that time. Time is too short to go into such details, to describe the insidious rottenness of that campaign from one end of the province to the other. But the result was what you might expect. The Government was wiped out of existence.

"There is this consolation, however. We can go on any public platform in the Province today and tell the same story we told in the campaign of 1935. Every man who was a follower or member of our government can say truly tonight that if we had to repeat that story, we would do so without the slightest variation. I wonder, ladies and gentlemen, how many among those thirty 'wonders' who are controlling—or rather miscontrolling—the destinies of this Province at the present time, can say that? How many of them could go on any platform in this province and tell the story he told the electors in 1935? (Loud applause).

"It is not for me to go into the history of the four years we were in power. You know it just as well as I do. You know the special difficulties we had to face in the destruction of the Prince of Wales College and the Falconwood Hospital. You know what we had to undertake in order to replace those two institutions in the time of

Canada's worst depression. "It was fortunate indeed that we had at the head of the Government of Canada a man of the statesmanship and calibre of the Rt. Hon. R.B. Bennett." (Applause). I was never more proud in my life than when standing on the platform in the Forum and introducing him to the most magnificent audience ever assembled in this Province. And I can say to you now what I said to that audience, that I was introducing Canada's ablest Prime Minister and Prince Edward Island's best friend." (Loud applause).

Tribute to Colleagues

"Fortunate for me as leader of the Government, when I went to Ottawa I had men of the calibre of the Hon. John A. MacDonald, of Messrs. Chester McLure and John Myers, who stood shoulder to shoulder with me in presenting the demands of this Province to Mr. Bennett and the members of his Cabinet. I was not lacking in friends when I made those trips to Ottawa, which my critics have been disposed to call 'picnics'. If there were any 'picnics' they were ones which paid this province well indeed, because we never went back without obtaining something for this province." (Applause).

"Look over the record. Add it up and find out how far short of a million and a half dollars we obtained from the Bennett Government during the four years we were in power. Those three men who sit behind me now, and a former member of the Bennett administration, the Hon. Mr. Hanson—those were the men who stood by Prince Edward Island and helped us out in our special difficulties.

"We felt that we were doing our duty, that there were certain conditions on the Island that demanded consideration. That is why we gave Old Age Pensions. (Although this had been promised on more than one occasion by the Liberals they never fulfilled their pledge). That is why we went into expenditure in the Public Works Department, in order that we might put some dollars into the pockets of the people who needed assistance most.

"Today, all over the Province, and from visitors who come to the Island, we hear praised in the most glowing terms this highway which runs from Charlottetown to Borden and connects with our other leading centre, Summerside. Yet when we were building it, when we were going to Ottawa fighting to get money, what was being said about it by our Liberal friends? 'Another of MacMillan's extravagances' that was going to ruin the Province.

Credit Where Due

"What have our friends done since they came into power to continue that work? Have they built one mile of paved road in this Province? Some of them are contemptible enough to try to take credit for building the Rustico highway. There sit the two men—McLure and Myers—who got the Rustico highway. (Applause). To those two gentlemen the whole credit goes. For years that part of the country had been clamouring for a railway, and you must admire the ability of those men who were to present an alternative scheme and convince the Dominion Government to give those people something that would be a real and lasting benefit. The Bennett Government voted \$100,000 for that ten mile stretch of highway; in other words they undertook to pay for it completely with the exception of the preparation, the ditching and other incidentals.

"How many votes did that get Messrs. McLure and Myers on election day? None. The very men who were working on the roads were the men who went to the polls and voted against us. What consideration are they getting since? (Laughter).

"The old age pensioners told us we were not paying them enough, and they too went to the polls and voted in large numbers against us. Are they any better off today? Are they getting any more? Will

work Mr. Albert Baker, a man whose experience, integrity and ability was of the greatest value in that capacity. And I say it was no credit to the Province when the Liberal Government let Mr. Baker go off that job. He had an eye to everything; every tool was kept under lock and key. I wonder what happened afterwards? (Laughter)

The work that should have been done in a month dragged on and on. In fact I don't know whether they are done yet." (Cries of "No!")

"Of course, we were only repairing the building. We were not putting in any fancy fixtures; we were not buying the most extravagant furnishings and fittings. All that was left to those who are there now. We appropriated \$40,000 for work which was deemed necessary and essential. When the Public Accounts come out, if you can figure it up, find out whether they haven't spent another hundred thousand dollars on it.

"They will go down in history, they say, as the House that had no Opposition. I suggest that they will go down for other reasons—for proving themselves the most incompetent government this Province ever had. They will go down as the government that fought like blazes among themselves. Why, you couldn't go through the Square when their caucus was meeting without overhearing the bedlam of sound. And if you could only see behind the doors, you would see one of them opening the door to an enraged colleague and telling him he didn't care if he never came back. (Laughter).

The National Park

"Take the National Park. When I first exposed the deal, months ago, and said the Government had committed themselves to a certain proposition, namely, Dalvey, I was met with criticism. Denials were made, but I persisted. I said more-over that they had passed an order-in-council. What was the result? The order-in-council had to be printed in the Pioneer. There the mouthpiece of the Liberal party, the Patriot, came out with it too, and said that if Dr. MacMillan had been 'fair and square' he would have indicated that there was a loop-hole in the order-in-council. (Laughter).

"I am not the type of man who believes in any government passing orders-in-council in which there are loop-holes; because an order-in-council with a loop hole is no good! (Applause).

"Time goes on; the engineers come down here; and finally come the announcement that there is to be a strip of land coming down and stopping next to Dalvey. After more family fighting among those thirty 'wonders' in the House, Dalvey is included now. And if I may venture the prediction, if you ever see a National Park in this Province it will be Dalvey and very little else." (Applause).

"But I want to ask you what good is a National Park going to do this Province? The Government must buy the site, and where are they going to get the money? Is it out of the three million dollars that they voted, and which some people say now has already been spent? The taxpayers of this Province have to dig down into their pockets to pay for the site of a National Park, because the Federal Government will only take it over on those terms.

Unemployment Relief

"Are they looking after the ones who are in need? Has relief been increased in this province? Is Charlottetown any better off? Are there any projects of work being done in Charlottetown except what has been forced upon them by the Mayor and City Council after continual fighting and even making trips to Ottawa in order that Charlottetown labouring men might be given a chance to eat and live? All that is turned lightly aside by those who are now in power.

"I can say sincerely that during my Premierhip I did everything in my power to do what I thought was in the best interests of this Province. I used every man, woman and child alike. (Applause).

"I challenge any one in this Province to say that I ever made any distinction between the electors. But that was not the story told in the last campaign. The story of MacMillan's 'extravagance' should have been a revelation after this Government came into power. Have you ever seen one bit of evidence to show that there was extravagance.

"How different is the record of the late MacMillan Government to the record of the Taschereau Government when it went out of existence." (Applause). I had the privilege of spending an hour with the new Prime Minister of Quebec, and after we discussed his difficulties for a while I remarked, "You have a big job." He said "We are only beginning; before we are through the people of Canada will be amazed that there should be so much rottenness in any government in Canada. That Government, I need not tell you, ladies and gentlemen, was a Liberal Government."

Spelling Disaster

"And where is the Liberal Government in this province drifting? A party in power without an Opposition spells disaster. Those men can go and sit in camera and do what they like with the taxpayers' money, without let or hindrance. If there was only a Public Accounts committee—if there were one or two men who could stand up in the House and compel them to answer questions on the Order Paper; it would reveal conditions that would startle the people of this Province. They say that is a 'wonderful' situation. It may be wonderful for them, but it spells disaster to the interests of Prince Edward Island." (Applause).

Continuing, Dr. MacMillan recalled that during the campaigns last year Mr. Peter Sinclair stumped the county with his "little story about the Sales Tax." "You people coming to town," Mr. Sinclair would say, "think you have got a dollar in your pocket, but you are mistaken. You have only got 94 cents. The other six cents goes to Bennett." Now I suppose when Mr.
