The new bridge at Lorne Valley is almost completed. Malcolm Macdonald, merchant, secured that tract by tender and began work last month and a half chains north of the old site. The following are employed on the construction of the bridge: Malcolm Macdonald, Wm. A. McLeod, Hugh Macdonald, Dan R. Swain, and Murdoch McDonald. Allan McSwain and George McLeod supplied part of the lumber. The dimensions of the bridge are as follows: Height from top of mud sill to top of plank covering nine (9) feet. Width inside of stanchions seventeen (17) feet. The water course is twenty feet clear. The work is now in operation with the aid of two scrapers.—L. L.

The Guardian's valued correspondent from Red Point writes: But little fishing has been done on our shores for the last month, owing to blistery weather, though a school of small cod-fish now abounds in our waters. From later information I made to correct the catches of fish were by William W. Coffin and John Robertson at Basin Head this season.—William W. Coffin along in a single day caught and landed 185 quintals of cod-fish and hake, (while John Robertson and a boy landed 250 quintals) the highest per man ever landed here, and I think likely the highest on the Island. Not a mackerel was hooked there this season, the American purse seine has done its work thoroughly and too well, and the modern traps will soon do the same with the lobsters.—Harry Taylor has arrived back from the potato fields of Maine, while a number of our Eastern young men are now in the lumber camps of that enterprise. CLOSING STOCK LETTER. (From F. B. McCurdy & Co's. Private Wire.)

NEW YORK—Randolph says: The opening was fairly active with prices irregularly changed from last night's close but with the majority of the issues somewhat lower. After a brief period of feverishness heavy selling

started, which continued during most of the session and which forced stocks down sharply all through the list. Leading issues breaking from two to four points below the early high level. The selling was very heavy and practically uninterrupted until the last hour when the pressure ceased and short covering caused a very sharp upturn bringing the majority of issue back to about last night's closing level. The activity and pressure were the greatest in Steel, of which there seemed for a long time to be an unlimited supply. There was no explanation of the heavy selling, but it was surmised that it might be by the same people who had been instrumental in advancing the market and who finding it impossible to sell stocks on a scale up had made up their minds to sell them on a declining market. The publication of the orders on hand of the Steel Corp'a. could not have had any effect on the stock as it had been very generally expected. Otherwise the news of the days was generally favorable, especially as regards the money market which showed increasing ease. Total sales—1,157,000.

CLOSING COTTON LETTER. (From F. B. McCurdy & Co's. Private Wire.)

NEW YORK—Price says: The cotton market has shown a decidedly stronger tone today, but while the assistance of the scattered speculative long interest has undoubtedly been shaken by the big ginning, between October 18th and November 1st so that the liquidation has continued offerings have been absorbed by a continued demand from abroad and trade sources. The market opened steady at an advance of 4 to 8 points in response to better cables than expected and during the first few minutes sold 12 to 17 points above the closing figures of yesterday on covering or bull support. Offerings became heavy on this bulge and a reaction followed which carried the market off 5 or 6 points from the top but the scattering liquidation was gradually absorbed the buying of trade interests increased on dips and the market ruled

generally steady to firm during the afternoon on reports of firmer spot markets and talk of a better demand for spots. The cables certainly suggest that the trade abroad feels more confidence in the crop estimates of around eleven million five hundred thousand by recognized authorities than the conclusive mathematical deductions based by local bears upon the census figures and our advice from the south indicate great confidence on the part of holders. Southern spot markets officially reported today were unchanged to one sixteenth higher. There is a rumor circulating later in the day that one of the local authorities who estimated the crop at about ten million six hundred thousand bales early in the season would issue a revised estimate tomorrow of eleven million one hundred thousand bales.
