PETERBORO, Ont., June 15.—Last night Dr. Gray, coroner, was at the second story window of his residence when he lost his balance and fell fifteen feet to the concrete walk below. He is suffering from a fracture of the base of the skull, several broken ribs and internal injuries.

MINISTERS SAVE REY. MR. JACKSON FROM CENSURE.

TORONTO, June 15.—By a majority of twenty-four, the Toronto Methodist Conference this morning refused to single out Prof. George Jackson's Studies in the Old Testament for condemnation by the general conference of the church. On a vote of 130 to 114 the conference rejected the Cleaver-Bull resolution in favor of a resolution moved by the Rev. W. L. Armstrong, of the Metropolitan church, seconded by Rev. H. L. Lovring, of Coldwater.

The Armstrong-Lovring amendment was as follows: "Viewing with much concern the apparent spirit of unrest in the minds of many, re the sacred truths of our religion, and fearing lest some may make shipwreck concerning the faith, members of the Toronto conference memorialize the general conference to take such action as it may deem necessary and wise for the conservation of the essentials of our faith, in the teaching in our colleges and pulpits, especially with relation to the reality and personality of God, the work of redemption, the deity of Jesus Christ, divine inspiration and the authority of the holy scripture, and the necessity of regeneration by the Holy Spirit."

The clerical vote saved the day for the Jackson forces. The lay vote was more than two to one against the Armstrong amendment.

DESPONDENT NEW YORK ARTIST KILLS HIMSELF.

NEW YORK, June 15.—Leon Guypon, well known as an artist and illustrator, shot himself through the head in his studio here today and was found dead on the floor, revolver by his side.

H. C. Merrill, a close friend, explaining the tragedy, tonight said that Guypon had been engaged to Miss Agnes Foster, daughter of a Boston banker, but had broken the engagement because of ill-health. He suffered with heart trouble and had been told by physicians that he might die at any time.

Warned by an hysterical letter Merrill hastened to the studio this afternoon hoping that he would be in time to dissuade Guypon from doing anything rash, but when he arrived he saw it was too late. Guypon was dead and on a table near by was a large envelope containing his last will and testament.

BOSTON, June 15.—Miss Agnes Foster, who was the fiancee of Leon Guypon, is the daughter of Albert J. Foster, president of the People's National Bank of Roxbury. Mr. Foster said tonight that his daughter's engagement to the artist was to have been announced tomorrow. He said he knew nothing about the breaking of the betrothal and that everything was apparently satisfactory and happy between the couple. Mr. Foster added that his daughter had known Mr. Guypon for several years.

FOREST FIRES RAGING NEAR PORT WILLIAM.

PORT WILLIAM, Ont., June 15.—For the past twenty-four hours forest fires have been burning north and west of here. Fanned by strong west wind and are now sweeping south. The power plant at Kamistiquia Falls, which supplies both Port William and Port Arthur, has been closed down to enable the men to fight the flames. The bush between Port Arthur and here is now on fire but there is no danger.

I. C. R. BOARD OF CONTROL FINISHES AT HALIFAX.

HALIFAX, June 15.—The members of the government railways management board left for Truro tonight en route for Sydney. This afternoon they went for a sail on the harbor and visited the Waegwoitic Club. From there they drove to the Silliker Car works, where they inspected the whole plant and a number of cars under construction for the I. C. R. Car wheels were being cast when they were at the works, and an order was given on the spot for 1,000 wheels.

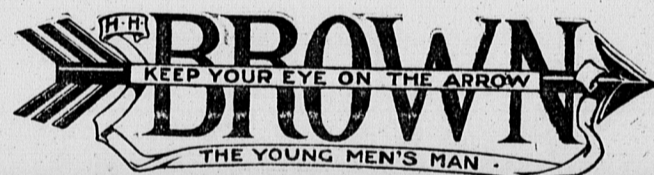

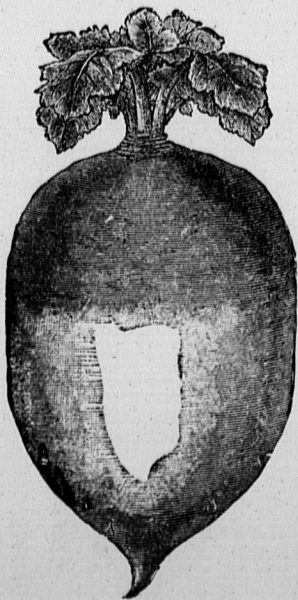
