WINNIPEG, June 26 (CP)—A
reported sale of 1,000,000 bushels of Canadian wheat for export to the United Kingdom featured dealings on Winnipeg grain exchange today.

Some of the export business reflected in the pit, in addition to the United Kingdom sales, traders reported that a cargo of wheat was taken by a neutral country. Some mill buying also came out but of heavy, Ontario Nickel was quite active at a loss of 3-8 to 12 5-8.

King George Signs Anglo-Russian Pact

LONDON, June 24 (CP)—The King signed the ratification of the Anglo-Russian mutual assistance pact late today.
The instrument of ratification was submitted to the King without awaiting the usual formalities of laying the treaty before parliament for a period of 21 parliamentary days.

The treaty has been ratified by the Soviet government. Ratifications are to be exchanged in Moscow.
