SEA SERPENT AGAIN SIGHTED

VICTORIA, Nov. 28.—Another appearance of "Cuddy", Vancouver Island's sea serpent, was recorded today by three men who believe they saw the monster in clear light yesterday.

The men are T. Sparks, wharfinger, at Ritchie's pier, Arthur Bradshaw, assistant wharfinger and R. Saunders.

Bradshaw stated he was attracted by a "wake" of something crossing from the direction of Victoria Harbor past the end of pier one. He thought a steamer had passed. But seeing no smoke called to Sparks and the two ran to the end of the pier. The "wake" was clearly defined for some 300 feet and not far away was "something" that was travelling about 30 miles an hour, going towards the breakwater.

Sparks said the head must have been close to the water for there was a dul of wave some distance from the part they could plainly see arched above the surface. The tall part was completely submerged. It had the appearance of a great log pushing through the water.

Pictou Miners Await Word From Officials

NEW GLASGOW, N. S., Nov. 28.—Maintenance crews provided the only action around otherwise deserted mines of the Acadia Coal Company as some 1,300 workers awaited word from union officials in regard to their rejection of proposed wage cuts.

There was no official action on the men's decision to oppose the reduction of 13 to 25 percent and it was anticipated no course would be drawn up by the men until after the return from Montreal of D. H. McDougall, receiver-liquidator.

Union executives refrained from commenting on the situation, and spokesmen for the "committee of ten" representing the men, said the committee had changed its previous plan to wait on company officials as announced last night when results of a referendum were made known. The vote, in which only 268 of the miners cast ballots, overwhelmingly rejected the lower wages receivers-liquidators contend are necessary to operate the three mines in Pictou County.

Bridgewater on being appointed master of ceremonies called upon Mr. Robert McDonald, vestry clerk of Saint John's Church, to read an address on behalf of the congregation. He spoke of the faithful manner in which Mr. Moore had fulfilled the office of churchwarden since 1886.

Mr. F. H. Best then read an address from Prince Arthur L. O. L. and Fred C. Sherren on behalf of the lodge presented Mr. Moore with a gold-headed cane inscribed "Presented to C. Moore from Prince Arthur L. O. L." and the church through Mr. Eric Lowther presented Mrs. Moore with a gold cross and chain inscribed "M." November 1883-November 1933," and a purse of gold jointly between Mr. and Mrs. Moore.

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Annual Meeting Valleyfield W.I.

The third annual meeting of the Valleyfield Women's Institute was held at the home of Mrs. Mal. D. Martin on Wednesday, Nov. 1, 1933. With the president, Mrs. (Rev.) D. M. Sinclair presiding, the meeting opened by repeating the Creed in unison. Roll call was responded to by paying the annual fee. Eleven members and two visitors were present. Minutes of last meeting, also of last annual meeting were read by the Secretary. The president's address was next in order. She expressed her appreciation of the co-operation of all members during the year, and gave a brief review of a most satisfactory year for our Institute.

Mrs. J. A. MacPherson reported for the Valleyfield East School Committee, and Mrs. W. A. Martin reported for Valleyfield West. The Secretary-Treasurer, Mrs. W. A. Bruce, gave the financial report for the year. It was moved and seconded that this report be adopted. Report of the District Convention at Grandview was given, also report of Hall Committee. Correspondence was read by Secretary and Institute News distributed.

The result of election of officers for the following year was as follows: President, Mrs. J. P. MacLeod; Vice-President, Mrs. M. D. Martin; Secretary-Treasurer, Mrs. Mal. S. MacLeod. Directors and Conveners of standing committees were all re-elected. Auditors, Mrs. Munro Bruce and Mrs. B. A. Weatherbie.

The retiring president asked the newly elected President to take the chair. An unanimous vote of thanks was presented to the retiring president, for her faithfulness and help in every way during the past year.

With Mrs. MacLeod in the chair the following new committees were appointed: Valleyfield West School Committee, Mrs. Munro Bruce and Mrs. W. A. Bruce; Valleyfield East School Committee, Mrs. B. A. Weatherbie and Miss Susie Campbell; Sick Committee, Mrs. Wm. Martin and Mrs. Mal. Martin; Program Committee, Mrs. Munro Bruce and Mrs. Edith MacDonald.

Roll call for next meeting was decided and collection was received. Contests were used by Program Committee and prizes were awarded. Meeting closed by singing "God Save the King." Refreshments were served by the hostess.

Traditions of the Moore family in a very creditable manner, and is highly respected by the general public; in fact we might say that he is a chip off the old block!

Your grandchildren, (who by the way are the fifth generation of the Moore family now cultivating the old ancestral acres), are nearly reaching manhood and womanhood, and are all apparently closely following in the footsteps of their ancestry, so that we who have gathered here this evening have come to the conclusion that you have both been blessed in a very special manner indeed; you have been blessed in your health, blessed financially above the common lot of mankind.

We are therefore glad to have this opportunity of congratulating you on this happy occasion, and the rector and parishioners of the said church, now unite in wishing you both many more years of usefulness and happiness in your native land.

We also desire to embrace the present opportunity of saying a few words to Mr. Moore in connection with the services that he has given to the church in this parish; we find by examining the old minute book that Messrs. Isaac Smith and Crisp Moore were duly elected Church Wardens on Easter Monday, April the 13th, A.D. 1885, forty-eight years ago on last April, and with the exception of some five years in the far distant past, Mr. Moore has filled this responsible position of Church Warden of old St. John's Church, and still continues in that office at the present time. You were until quite recently also treasurer, and had full control of the financial part, so it is easily seen that your office has been, and is now quite a hard position to fill, but at the same time this position you have successfully filled to the complete satisfaction of the parishioners; if it had been otherwise Mr. Moore would have been relieved from all this work long ago, as he has frequently asked to be allowed to resign, but the

parishioners have so far prevailed on him to continue in office, as we all considered that it would be a hard matter to appoint a successor capable of taking his place.

In the olden times it was by no means all sunshine, keeping the church running along smoothly. Money was scarce, many of our people were poor, and none wealthy, at times some of our people might not like the rector, he might be too high or too low. This never daunted our senior warden. He knew nothing about high or low, he was always just a good solid "church man." He served under many rectors, and he considered them all good men, doing God's work in the parish to the best of their ability, sometimes under very trying circumstances, and for very small stipends.

If there were any acrimonious feelings in the parish Mr. Moore always tried to soothe them out. His motto was, "Touch not the Lord's anointed, and do my Prophets no harm!"

Now we don't want to say too much in Mr. Moore's praise, for fear that he might get to have too much conceit of himself in his old days, but at the same time there is something further in his favour that we must mention this evening and that is concerning his attendance in God's House. We may truthfully say that Crisp Moore was always present at every service, no roads too bad, and no weather too bad, although he had quite a long bad road to travel to get to church, but notwithstanding all this, we know that he has no equal for church attendance in this vicinity and perhaps not in this Province.

Now we must bring this rambling address to a close by tendering you our sincere and hearty thanks for the manner in which you have performed your duties as Church Warden of our dear old church, and would respectfully ask you to accept this small present from the rector and parishioners, as a slight token of their appreciation of your

uniting zeal for the welfare of the parish church.
