SIR ROBERT BORDEN NOT COMING.—Rev. Dr. Fullerton, President of the Patriotic Society, telegraphed yesterday to Sir Robert Borden, asking him, if possible during his visit to the Maritime Provinces to give an address in Charlottetown under the auspices of the Patriotic Society. Last night he received a telegram from the Prime Minister expressing regret that the time at his disposal for his visit would not permit him to come to Prince Edward Island.

DEAF SCHOOL.—The Principal of the School for the Deaf, Halifax, N. S., would be obliged if medical men, clergymen or teachers would let him know of any deaf or partially deaf children in their neighbourhood. There are many children throughout the Maritime provinces whose hearing is so defective that they cannot be successfully taught in the ordinary hearing schools. Such children are eligible for admission to the school for the Deaf at Halifax where their speech will be perfected and lip-reading taught to them.

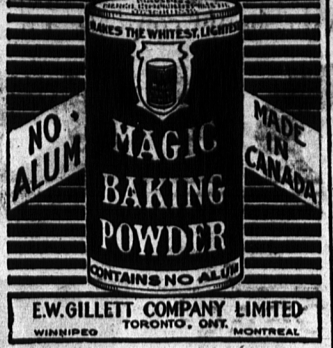
