Alberton Town
Council Meeting

The regular meeting of the
Town Council was held on Novem-
ber 14. Mayor Profit presided. Pre-
sent were Councillors Matthews,
Weeks, Moran and Currie.
Minutes of last meeting were
read and approved. Bills amount-
ing to \$384.33 passed. Street com-
mittee reported two new bridges
built and two more on Church
Street must be built immediately
and that all had to be done with
wood due to difficulty of obtaining
more durable material.
Finance committee reported first
notice had been sent to taxpayers
who are in arrears and response
from same not very satisfactory.
Second notices are to be sent at
once.

A motion was passed that all
bills must be voted paid by council
before being settled by clerk.
Policeman reported that in sev-
eral places ditches were filled in
by property holders and were
hindering drainage. He also re-
ported present jail very unsatis-
fying and advised a new building
be erected by the fire hall.
The Council was led to inspect
present jail and decided to have
a special meeting called on Novem-
ber 15th to discuss erection of new
building.—D.

Supreme Court
Opens At S' Side

A Grand Jury at the opening of
the fall term of the Supreme Court
at Summerside yesterday found a
true bill in the only criminal case
presented for its consideration.
The case is that of Frank Arsenault
of Howland R.R. charged with
having carnal knowledge of a child
under 14 years of age. He was at-
tained and pleaded not guilty and
his trial was set down for Decem-
ber 12.

In the appeal case of the King
(appellant) vs. Reginald Gay
(appellee), an appeal from a con-
viction under the Temperance Act,
the conviction was quashed but no
costs were allowed.

The civil case of Alton Webb vs.
P. C. Ramsay, damages for libel,
was set down for December 3rd
and the civil case of John W. Palmer
vs. Herman G. Bryan, damages
for trespass, will follow immedi-
ately on completion of the first
case.

bell presided at the opening of the
term yesterday and counsel in at-
tendance were: Attorney-General
Walter E. Darby, K.C.; J.S. Des-
Roches, K.C.; Heath Strong, K.C.;

Plan Campaign
To Aid Blind

A meeting was held in the Town
Hall, Summerside, last evening for
the purpose of organizing for the
carrying on of a financial drive on
December 12, 13 and 14 in aid of
the work of the Canadian Insti-
tute for the Blind. On these days
a campaign for funds is being car-
ried on in all Island centers.

Mr. Gordon Foster, Charlot-
teton, of the advisory committee
of the Canadian National Institute
for the Blind, spoke to the meet-
ing, explaining the history and
work of this organization. He
said that there are more than 150
blind people in this Province.
L. Col. K. S. Rogers, Charlottet-
ton, chairman of the financial
drive outlined the plans that have
been made for the campaign and
stressed the need for funds.

Mr. G. E. Wood, field secretary
of the C. N. I. B. for this Province,
explained the work that he is do-
ing among the blind persons of
the Province, seeing that they re-
ceive training and education and
obtain suitable employment so
that they may become independ-
ent.

His Worship, Mayor J. F. Arnett,
a member of the advisory com-
mittee acted as chairman. Major
J. S. DesRoches, also a member
of the advisory committee was
present as well as representatives
of interested clubs. A meeting of
the local men present was held
later to make preliminary plans
for the drive in Summerside.—S.
