Wedding Party Cast Out Devils

ROME, May 21.—"Casting out devils" is a custom prevailing in some parts of the South Italian district of Salerno, where exorcism of evil spirits by means of ancient ritual has caused the death of a woman believed to be "possessed."

After a wedding banquet at an inland village one of the guests, Antonietta Nigro, having fed well, if not wisely, showed signs of mental disturbance. Shouting disconnected sentences, she fell to the ground writhing in contortions.

No explanation occurred to the peasants present but that Antonietta was possessed by a legion of evil spirits.

In accordance with the ancient tradition of St. Antonio, the supposed maniac was carried in a procession by the wedding party to the church in which is a broken column whose in old times devils were wont to be cast out.

By the legendary ritual, a cord, is passed around the feet, the waist, and the neck of the subject, and also round and round the column.

When the evil spirits are driven out invisible hands ring unseen bells.

Having found Antonietta, the relatives waited in the churchyard for ten minutes. Hearing no bells, they re-entered the church, and found that the woman had strangled herself as she writhed in delirium with the cord about her neck.

Parties to the attempted exorcism have been arrested, as the ancient superstitious ceremony is no longer recognised by either Church or State.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 21.—The stowaway business is played out. If you are a cinema actor you conceal yourself on a ship and tell your story later to a beautiful girl but if you are only a vaudeville artist like Thomas Casson you may tell your story to the magistrates.

Thomas Casson, who is 31 years old, wanted to get to America to join relatives there. He booked a passage on the Cameronian, putting down \$100.

Then he met a dock watchman at Leith persuasive enough to induce Casson to cancel his passage. The watchman, having probably stayed in this country all his life, knew a very quick and cheap route to America. For this ungodly information he would charge Casson \$15.

Casson fell. He agreed to stow away. He was told that out of the \$15, \$4 would be given to an apprentice on the S. S. Cairnross to look after him on the voyage.

Casson, accompanied by two other men (names unknown) boarded the vessel and was hidden in the peak. One of the men was placed with him for company; that all Casson got. The apprentice, if he knew anything about it, forgot to supply the meals.

Casson and his friend were hopeful, but two days without water made them drier than the land they were going to. They suffered. The artist's friend raved for water, but with a misplaced hope that the apprentice would yet succor them they held out another two days. Then they were obliged to surrender.

Captains have no sympathies with people who go to sea when they might stay on land, and the stowaways were made to work.

In time the vessel got to Portland, Maine, and the stowaways to the goal therein. Ten days later Casson was shipped back to the magistrates, of his home town.

The magistrates showed Casson that his endeavours to save money on his passage was false economy.

Nearly Buried Alive

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GOLDEN JUBILEE OF I. O. F.

Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor will be the principal speaker at the international golden jubilee celebration of the Independent Order of Foresters which will open in Newark on June 17th, according to W. H. Hunter, Supreme Chief Ranger of the society.

The order was founded in Newark on June 17, 1871. Mr. Gompers was a charter member and became the first Grand Marshal of the society. He is one of the few survivors among the 500 men who helped organize the fraternity. In the fifty years of its existence the society has grown to a membership of 155,000 in the United States and Canada.

Governor George E. Shiner of New Jersey will officially open the golden jubilee exercises in Dreamland Park with an address of welcome to thousands of visiting Foresters from New York, Pennsylvania, Maryland, New England and Eastern Canada. Among other prominent speakers will be senator Walter E. Edge of New Jersey and Supreme Chief Ranger, W. H. Hunter. Athletic games, band concerts, a memorial service and a reception in the evening will complete the program.

Following the observances in Newark the Foresters will take special trains to Niagara Falls, Ont., where beginning June 19 the main events of the golden jubilee will take place. The celebration will last four days and thousands of delegates from all over the United States and Canada will be present.

Hon. Curtis D. Wilbur, secretary of the navy of the United States, who has been a Forester for many years will, it is expected, be guest of honor. Addresses will be made by Premier G. Howard Ferguson of Ontario and Supreme Chief Ranger Hunter. On June 22, the headquarters will proceed to Toronto, the headquarters of the society where the celebration will conclude with a memorial service in one of the prominent churches.
