Report of Ch'town Business College

The regular work of the Fifty-third term of the Charlottetown Business College was completed last week, but, as a number of the students in the business training department—who had completed the prescribed course—were required at home for a short time, they were permitted to go, returning on the 16th instant to take their final examinations. These examinations are now in progress. Reviewing the work of the term, Principal Miller informs us that that it has been one of the best and most exciting in the history of the college. The attendance, in point of numbers and quality, has been most gratifying, and he was proud to sum up the result of the work of the term. The quality of the product of the term was undoubtedly first-class as evidenced by the demand for frequently students were sent from the class-room to fill—what afterwards proved to be—permanent positions, giving to the splendid satisfaction they gave. "I have had, said Principle Miller, more compliments paid me this term by employers on the work of our graduates than I ever received in any one year before. These honours are not only handed to me personally, but frequently come from abroad by letter. This is most satisfactory."
