

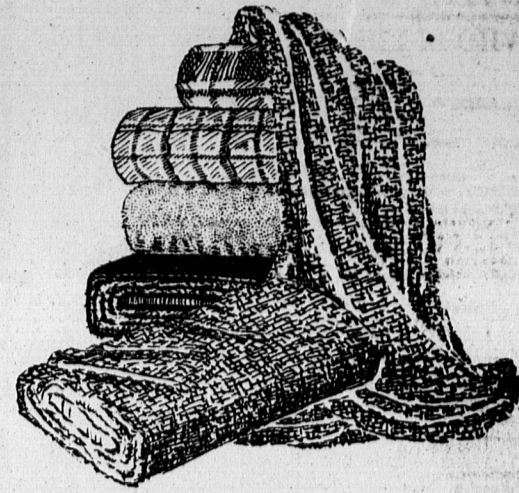

leadership and has since been more or less free from party affiliations. The present distress of the King Government over the disability of two of its most prominent members has apparently resulted in a renewed and urgent invitation to Mr. Crerar to join the Ministry which he is expected shortly to do. He had a very large majority at the election of 1921 in Marguette Manitoba and could probably be re-elected there.

Mr. Crerar has considerable ability and influence among the prairie farmers, and knows from personal experience something of the inner work and aims of the Liberal, Unionist and Progressive parties, with all of which he has been at various times connected with in a few years past. The country is weary of the group system and three cornered elections in our political system and it would be a source of general satisfaction if both the Liberals and Conservatives who strayed into the Progressive fold would return to their old home ground before another general election. But no power on earth can compel them to do this and what they will do can only be guessed at. But if several leading Progressives join the King Government it must greatly weaken what remains of the Farmer's party.

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. JAMES J. KELLY
Fort Augustus parish sustained a distinct loss by the death at her home on the evening of Jan. 2nd, of Mrs. James J. Kelly at the age of 53 years, who was caught up from labor and the sorrows of earth by the hand of God who appeared more anxious that His servant should receive the reward of merit than that she should continue her exemplary life here below. During her illness which was of short duration the shadow of death had been slowly and steadily extending itself toward her home but despite all that medical skill and the constant care of tender and loving hands could do, the grim

messenger crossed the threshold and she breathed her soul peacefully into the hands of the God who gave it.

Spiritual consolations were afforded her by her pastor, Father A. J. McDonald who visited her frequently during her illness. Mrs. Kelly was an exemplary wife and mother in every way worthy of her husband and children's love and well deserving of the admiration and esteem of the community where she resided. She was the home and it was her kingdom and how gently and with loving care and solicitude she ruled over it was easily seen in the happiness that radiated from those around her. Yet more, hidden beneath that external demerit, was evident in her daily conduct were the principles of genuine womanly goodness. Besides being possessed of those lovable traits of character the deceased was a model christian and during her illness a most heroic sufferer.

During her brief illness she suffered intensely, yet she never murmured. She knew that the end was approaching and calm resignation was stamped upon the once bright countenance. Being possessed of a large heart and sympathetic nature her womanly ministrations were not confined to her home alone, as she was often to be found where suffering and need claimed her help. The appreciation of sympathy and help that throughout life she gave to others was strongly shown by those who came to her home on death, men and women of all classes and creeds grieving with a sense of personal loss in realization of the beautiful spirit passed beyond their memory of her will never grow dim and thus has she gained immortal

life in this world and in the next for "to live in the hearts of those we leave behind is not to die."

A life such as hers leaves to the community an example of what a loving and faithful member of the church may do in the way of ever manifesting the beauty and the truth of the faith that is infused into us as members of the Holy Church. In a sense hers was an unostentatious and unobtrusive life yet she diffused an atmosphere of christian virtue which was always appreciated by those privileged to enjoy her presence. Her affability and kindness of heart were but the children of her very religious soul and to make others happy was the objective of her most charitable desires and designs.

This noble trail is a fond memory indeed to her family and to her friends. Her perfect devotedness and her fidelity unbroken in her span of years among them have made deep impress and if more could be desired Mrs. Kelly gave it with afulness during her short illness. Her heroic patience in the anguish of physical pain, her thoughtfulness of those depending themselves to ease and comfort her, the calm and pious resignation to God's Holy will, and its acceptance finally in death, a most happy death as His answer to her imploring prayers, these were the virtues she carried with her to the Judge, in whom she so firmly believed, confidently relied upon and ardently loved. Fortified with all the sacramental strength and consolations of the Catholic Faith, surrounded by her devoted husband and children she breathed forth her soul into the hands of its creator. Burdened with grief her family and her many friends have a great consolation left to them that in her life and death Mrs. Kelly showed herself unselfish

tion as a true child of God, a devoted of His Virgin Mother, a loyal child of His holy Church. With such merits they can confidently hope and lovingly cherish the thought that eternal rest is to be hers and that heaven is to be her perpetual home. Just before her death she was consoled by the presence of her son Rev. J. Edwin Kelly, of Wichita, Kansas who came to her bedside on hearing of her serious illness. Her remains were conveyed for burial from her home at Fort Augustus to St. Patrick's Church followed by a large concourse of sorrowing relatives and friends.

Requiem High Mass was chanted by her son Father J. Edwin Kelly, who also performed the absolution and conducted the services at the grave assisted by Father A. J. McDonald, Pastor, Father McGuigan, Vernon River and Fathers Rooney and McKenzie of the Cathedral staff. After the impressive service in the church the procession proceeded slowly to the cemetery where the sorrowful duty of committing dust to dust was performed amid the tears of relatives and friends and the silent sympathy of an assemblage consisting of all classes.

The spiritual offerings of masses and prayers etc., were numerous evidencing the affection and esteem of a large circle of friends. Besides her husband she leaves to mourn four sons, Rev. J. Edwin of Wichita, Kansas, Francis W. at home, Eugene in Minneapolis and Lucious O. Seattle, Wash. also two daughters sister Joseph Eugene of the Sisters of St. Joseph, Minneapolis, Minn and Sarah Kathleen at home. There also remain two brothers and five sisters. The pall-bearers were: William Duffy, John Wisner, Patrick Duffy, Jos. E. Roach, John Kelly and Lawrence Herron.
