Last Legal Threat Removed From Title Bout; Farr May Meet Winner In London

Teams Must Be Registered By July 1st

(By Alan Gould) (Associated Press Sports Writer) CHICAGO, June 18—Removal of the last threat of a legal blockade for the Jim Braddock-Joe Louis heavyweight title fight, set for next Tuesday night at Comiskey Park, came today with the disclosure of co-promoter Mike Jacobs plans to conduct two more championship matches this year, in London and New York.

Having apparently wrested virtually complete control of the heavy-weight situation from Madison Square Garden, for the first time since Tex Rickard passed out of the picture, Jacobs plans to solidify his position on "all fronts," at home and abroad.

Jacobs disclosed plans for the Braddock-Louis winner to fight Tommy Farr, British Empire heavyweight champion, in a world title match at the White City Stadium, London, although specifying he would make no formal announcements until after Tuesday's 15-round bout.

Jacobs has been advised a championship match in London will be subject only to a five per cent government tax on gate receipts, that promoters will "take care of income tax requirements," and that such a bout, the first ever held in the British capital, will draw close to \$1,000,000.

The Garden took a "third strike" today when the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals, in Philadelphia, ruled by a 2 to 1 vote against the Garden's appeal for an injunction to stop Braddock from fighting Louis here. This apparently forestalls any 11th-hour attempt to halt the Chicago bout.

Jacobs desires to promote a third world title fight, late in September, and preferably at New York's Yankee stadium. Up to now it has been the general belief Schmelzing would figure in the next title match. Max, like most everyone else in the heavyweight industry, is under contract with Jacobs, but the Teuton's plans remain a mystery.

Louis was a 3 to 1 favorite over Braddock on the basis of several wagers confirmed by fight writers today. One bet of \$3,000 to \$1,000 was made, but the wagering has been small-scale otherwise.

Groundwork for the London job was laid this spring when Jacobs conferred with Brit. Gen. A. C. Critchley, Calgary-born British sports promoter who is associated with Sydney Hulls, English promoter.

Now it is understood Jacobs also has a tentative agreement with Braddock, binding the champion to continue fighting under the New York promoter's auspices. It remains to be seen, however, just what Madison Square Garden or the New York State fight fathers may do, if and when Jacobs attempts further heavyweight title promotion in Manhattan.

IN THIS CORNER

Island intermediate and junior baseball clubs should note particularly the letter appearing on this page today from Mr. J. B. Carrigan, Summerside, Vice-President of the M. P. B. A. U. of C. for Prince Edward Island as regards registering of teams wishing to compete in Maritime playdowns.

The letter is a timely warning and states explicitly all matters governing registration of players. The past two seasons local clubs have run into difficulties over this same question. In fact the intermediates were suspended two seasons in succession, apparently for not attending to the matter in due time and as a result a lot of grumbling and growing was heard over what those affected deemed as an unnecessary action.

We were not in a position to determine the merits of any such protest that may have arisen out of speaking of this year, there is no reason why the same thing should happen again. The clubs and different managements, now that they know the requirements to be met and have any intention of registering their teams, should get busy immediately and not wait for any last minute action as is usually the case.

If present plans materialize Prince Edward Island is soon to have a Children's Camp and Tourist Resort to be conducted on similar lines to American Beach Clubs which are proving so popular throughout the United States. The man behind the mooted movement is Commodore Louis L. McIntyre of New York, for 25 years a Life Guard along the Atlantic Coast, the last 10 years of which found him in command of Long Island Sound.

If the plans go through the Camp would comprise 100 acres of land along a waterfront and besides proving attractive to Islanders in general would be an attraction for tourists. In addition Mr. McIntyre, in his letter to Mr. James Penderson of Kensington, mentioned that it might be possible to build an outdoor training ring and bleachers for Island boxers having in view holding of Canadian-American boxing championships.

This latter matter appears a little far-fetched, but in his letter Mr. McIntyre appeared very enthusiastic over it and felt sure that Island boys given the proper training and conditioning would in more than hold their own in competition with youngsters from the U. S. in amateur fighting. Further developments in the matter will be watched with interest.
