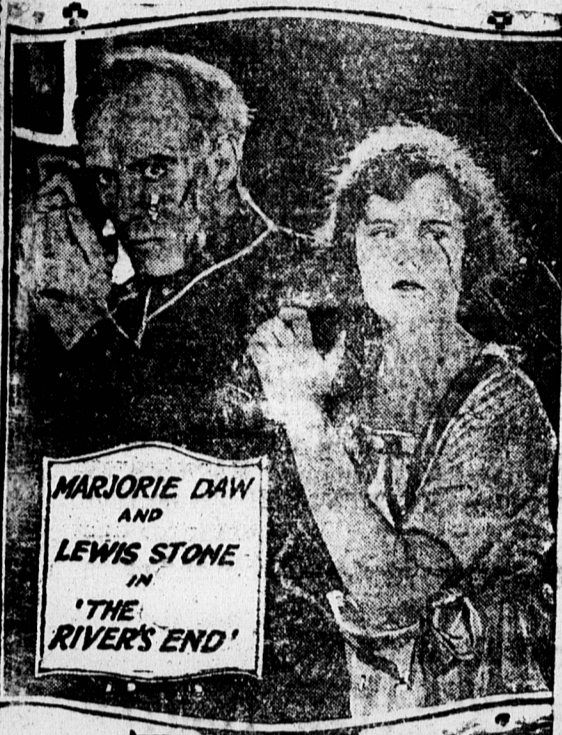

## Cat Puts To Rout Entire Household

Infuriated, Pat Gives Batt: From Ground Floor to Roof, Sending Four Persons to Hospital, And Surrenders: Only to a Policeman

NEW YORK, March 9.—Mrs. Mary Boone, her two daughters, Helen, thirteen and Genevieve, fourteen, and Robert Atreed, another tenant in the house at 562 West Fifty-second street, went to the health department for the Pasteur treatment because they failed to give the proper amount of attention to Molly, the Boone's pet cat, and her four tiny kittens. Molly showed resentment first on Sunday night, and on Monday night completed the demonstration by routing most of the families in the house. Mrs. Boone and the two girls and Atreed were badly bitten and scratched.

Molly's kittens were two weeks old Sunday. She was playing with them in the kitchen of the Boone flat when Helen Boone allowed a stray tabby in the room. The child petted the strange cat and Molly snarled in rage.

Before Mrs. Boone reached the box to catch her, she had bitten the child half a dozen times on the left arm and leg. Mrs. Boone also suffered bites and scratches.

The next night, Molly sprang at the second girl because she passed the four kittens without noticing them, according to Mrs. Boone. Her arms and legs were clawed and her screams were heard throughout the house. Other tenants, among them Atreed, came to her rescue and the cat jumped to the fire escape landing and managed to climb almost to the roof.

Atreed, armed with a club, went to the roof and tried to dislodge the cat. She leaped at him, ripped the skin from his face and hands and bit him severely before dropping to the shed again.

The cat's return to the Boone flat occurred at a moment when all most a score of men, women and children were there helping give first aid to the mother and her daughters. There was a mad dash for exits, and the cat took possession. Policeman Meltzer of the West Forty-seventh street station, who responded to calls for help, trapped Molly under a box and took her away for detention and examination by the health authorities.

Mrs. Boone and the youngest girl went to Roosevelt Hospital with the other daughter and Atreed. After their wounds had been cauterized they were instructed to go to the health department.

YUKON PROSPERING—Advices received at Dawson, Yukon, from Fort MacPherson dated February 15, and brought out by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police expedition which left Dawson about the first of the year, say that letters received there from Fort Norman say that the oil well there was flowing 1500 barrels daily. When oil was struck it shot 15 to 20 feet above the derrick, which was eighty feet high. The pressure blow the cap off ten times during the first six hours. ## World Wide Lutheran Celebration on April 17th

NEW YORK, March 9.—Eighty millions of Lutherans and innumerable other Protestants, it is announced here by the National Lutheran Council will participate in a world-wide celebration on April 17 of the 400th anniversary of the arraignment of Martin Luther before the Diet at Worms.

"When Luther nailed his nine-ty-five theses upon the door of the University and refused to recant his alleged heresies despite the threat of excommunication," says the statement of the Council, "he helped to usher in modern religious and civil liberty. Denouncing as tyranny the enslavement of Christian conscience, the dauntless monk declared the Bible to be the only infallible rule of faith and practice, and closed his defence with the words, "There I stand, I can do naught otherwise. So help me God! Amen!"

The main purpose of the celebration, it is stated, is to obtain a clearer understanding of how Lutherans and Christians of other denominations throughout the world may become "more effective in bringing God's will to bear powerfully upon the present, unhappy world conditions." To this end, special congregational services will be held on Sunday, April 17 and at 4 p. m. on that day, the hour when Luther was summoned to confront his judges, all Christians are invited to read the Scriptures, meditate and pray for "unity and unity of the Christian faith effectiveness in all good work and the advancement of true Christian liberty, brotherhood and universal good-will."

A message from the council, addressed to the Lutherans of every land, recommended the quadricentenary as "a fitting time to review the benefits inherited from Luther's unshakable utterance. The tribune of the church and state potentates that could have been gathered anywhere in the world at that time." It continued:

### Burned His Bridges

"A century earlier John Huss appeared before such a body under very similar charges and was burned at the stake, Luther knew that, but he went fearlessly forward to the test. He knew that his writings gave expression to the deepest yearnings of multitudes of pious souls among his countrymen. He had arrived at a new principle of religious authority. He definitely rejected all authority except the Word of God in matters of religion. With the dramatic scene at Worms, Luther burned all bridges behind him.

"The incident contributed another principle that is vital to the modern world. The principle of separate functions for Church and State; the only principle that guarantees freedom of conscience, right of private judgment and religious toleration.

"Times not yet born were listening. Thus the spirit of modern liberty was conceived in the first quarter of the 16th century in the rugged soul of a medieval monk. It was born in the last quarter of the 18th century on the Atlantic seaboard of the North American continent. And now, on this first quarter of the 20th century by the grace of God it is coming to full maturity all over the world."

### HOW TO INTRODUCE A ROTATION OF CROPS

First consider the approximate average of grain, hay, pasture and hood crops which will be required; next consider the quality of soil which is on the farm. grain. This rotation gives a very good proportion of the various crops. It is very satisfactory.

A three year rotation: hood crop; grain; clover hay. This rotation has a very large area of hood crop and provides no pasture land. It is, therefore, unsuited to most farms. However, if the fertility of the soil is very poor, if additional pasture land is available, and if considerable stock are kept which will consume the hood crops, the rotation is very satisfactory.

There are, of course, many other rotations but the above mentioned have perhaps, the most general application. It is quite probable that portions of the farm, on account of being either too wet or too light and sandy, may have to be farmed under a separate cropping system. Under such conditions if this area is not too large it is undoubtedly more profitable to leave it undivided by fences and to recolon the entire area as one year in the new rotation, with such a system, a field of poor soil may be increased in fertility by a short rotation of crops and by larger applications of manure. A field of low wet land may be left longer in hay.

One consideration should not be overlooked. The fields should be made large in order to reduce the cost of producing crops and to discontinue the depreciation and repair of fences. The rotation should be planned so that the horses would be kept busy as much as possible throughout the year because it costs money to have horses standing idle. While almost all farmers follow some practice of changing the crops on their fields from year to year, very few have adopted a definite rotation of crops. The adoption of a suitable rotation will reduce the cost of production and will make more profit.

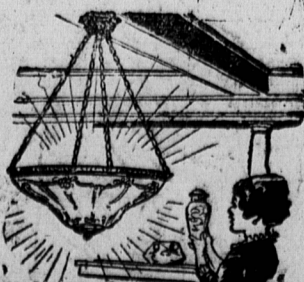
