WILL BE LAUNCHED IN THE NEAR FUTURE

OTTAWA, March 21.—A new organization, "Canada's Sons," which will have for its object the development of an extensive and thorough Canadian patriotic spirit, had its initial meeting, last night, when a number of the city's prominent men met to discuss the proposed by-laws of the organization and to formulate plans for a membership drive, which will be launched in the near future.

The first branch of the organization will be effective in Ottawa, in the near future, and then organizers will work throughout Canada. One of its objects is to get away from race distinctions in Canada, and to bring all, Scotch, English, Irish, French and all other factions, into one body for the general benefit of the country.

Annual Meeting P.E.I. Horse Racing

The annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Horse Racing Association was held in the Club Rooms of the Charlottetown Driving Club, Thursday evening, March 17th. There was a large attendance of horsemen and the various racing tracks of the Province were represented. The President, Mr. Hammond Kelly addressed the meeting as follows:

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND HORSE RACING ASSOC. Gentlemen:—Our Association has passed another year in its history, and we meet tonight to take a glance, as it were, over the events of that year, and sum up the benefits which have accrued to us through its formation, and also to plan for greater things to be done in the future. We can pride ourselves in the fact that our Association has accomplished much in the short two years of its history. It has bound together into a strong bond of union, the various race tracks of this Province, and in this way has given an unbroken chain of meetings dating from the first of July until the latter part of August. These meetings have been characterized by the largest attendance of spectators, greatly interested in the King of Sports. Our horsemen have been present in force and the various classes have filled splendidly.

We take a further pride that these meetings have been the means of bringing out some of the noted performers in the Maritime races during the years 1919 and 1920.

In 1920 we particularly recall Miss Belle Rico 2.16 1/2, Upon Prince 2.19, Dick C. 2.14 1/4, Keumah Aubrey and Ed Locanda, 2.21 1/2 and various other good trotters and pacers who have made their reputation from racing on our Island circuit.

By having a weekly meeting in various sections of the country, we not only give the public an opportunity to witness good horse racing, but we also keep the tracks in operation in the various sections, thereby promoting the training of racing material and from that training developing race horses which command big prices.

In order to maintain public confidence and public interest we must endeavor to witness good horse racing, and to preserve the present high standard of racing, and to maintain the most exemplary discipline, so that public patrons can take their friends, wives and children to the meetings with the utmost confidence, and in the least offensive way. This has been the feature of our racing in the past, and we must keep our standard as high in the future.

The problem of transportation has been a serious factor in drawing the crowd, and it is altogether likely that for the future we will have to rely largely upon automobiles. We must therefore use every effort to encourage the owners of automobiles to bring their friends and family with them, and in order to make it comfortable for them when they do come, I think we should provide the best possible space for their cars. Another matter, race goers depend largely on race tracks to supply their meals and refreshments, and there is no doubt that the favourable or unfavorable opinion of a meeting, irrespective of the quality of the entries, is in a great measure governed by the quality of the eatables, so it would seem good business to make this department as attractive as possible.

Owing to the increased costs of racing horses, it is felt by many owners that some inducement should be held out to the horsemen in the way of freight allowance, so that the non-traveler is not out to much financially.

These, and various other matters will come up for discussion tonight, and will no doubt be solved by you.

Gentlemen, I cannot close without again complimenting you on the splendid work which your Association has accomplished, and to thank you for your kindness in electing me to the important office of President during the past year.

on, July 6th; Charlottetown, Orange Tea, July 12th, Garfield, July 16th; Kensington, July 20th; Souris, July 27th; Montague, August 10th; New Annan, August 17th; Caledonia Club, Charlottetown, August 24th.

Considerable discussion took place regarding the classes for the circuit this year and it was the prevailing opinion that the classes should be much the same as last year. Quite a few present favored having colt races along with the other races.

Mr. Kelly brought up the matter of assistance from tracks for non-money winners. As it is now, the non-money winner is out a considerable amount of money owing to high freight rates. It was suggested that tracks should give the non-money winner free transportation.

Mr. P. S. Brown, who is a member of the executive of the Canadian Trotting Association addressed the meeting on behalf of that body, pointing out that this is a Canadian organization and therefore, deserving of patronage, also that its fees were lower than the National Association and he urged the various tracks in the Province to be affiliated with it. Col. McKinnon stated that he thought it would be a great mistake to drop our affiliation with the National Trotting Association, which is a very powerful body, controlling all racing tracks in the Maritime Provinces, Quebec and practically all Eastern United States. He claimed also that its powers of discipline were very much stricter than the Canadian Association.

Remarks were made by Mr. J. McGrogan, Montague; Mr. Dawson, Cape Traverse; Messrs. Jas. Pendergast, G. H. Hooper, H. H. Acorn and various others. Mr. P. S. Brown stated that he believed with proper representation to the Railway Officials, lower freight rates could be obtained for race horses. This was concurred in by Mr. H. H. Acorn and a committee consisting of Mr. P. S. Brown, Mr. H. H. Acorn and Col. McKinnon were asked to cooperate with other racing associations and endeavor to secure more favorable rates.

A little friction developed between Garfield and North Tryon; both claiming the same date, July 6th. The matter, however, was amicably adjusted. Mr. McLeod generously conceding the date to North Tryon and taking instead Saturday, July 16th.

The meeting broke up at a late hour; the various secretaries leaving for their homes the next morning.

THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, March 19.—A weak feeling continues to prevail in the market for eggs today. The price scored a further decline of 1c per dozen. At the reduction there was a good demand for supplies to meet immediate wants and quite an active trade was done in a jobbing way at 42c per dozen. The receipts today were 2,388 cases, as compared with 2,424 for the same day last week and 1,585 for the corresponding day a year ago.

There were no new developments in the market for dressed poultry today, the feeling being very firm for all lines on account of the continued good demand for supplies for immediate consumption. The market is fairly active and the volume of business passing is larger than usual for the season of 1921.

We quote wholesale jobbing prices as follows: Turkey, choice 60c to 62c Good turkeys 55c to 57c Geese 30c to 35c Chickens 40c to 42c Ducks 40c to 41c Fowls 32c to 35c

The market for potatoes remains about steady, but the volume of business in our lots is reported small on account of the fact that buyers seem to be fairly well supplied for the time being. Green Mountains were quoted at \$1 to \$1.15, and Quebec cited at 95c per

ICE RACES

The New London Ice Racing Association had their first races on Tuesday, March 15th. The course chosen was on the Stanley River and a more perfect course has never been the luck of the association to race upon.

The classes called were a three minute and two fifty which brought to the ring of the bell five starters in each class. The three minute was the first called and although run of in straight heats was a good race throughout. The two fifty was a cracker-jack. The first heat was won by Dora H. with Gold Chip right on her pad. Winnie C. a very good third Nimble Lady fourth and the Speedy Little Princess Edna on her very bad behavior fifth. The second heat was an exact repetition of the first except that Winnie C. and Nimble Lady were stronger competitors. Things then began to lean on in the third heat that veteran horseman Robert Fitzsimmons piloted Gold Chip to first position a feat quite probably could not be done by any other man of his age on P. E. I. Dora H. right there and Winnie C. close up Nimble fourth Princess fifth. Then the unexpected happened. At the word go in the fourth heat Chip dropped back and Winnie and Dora went to it, the latter going to a break and Winnie leading to within a few yards of the wire when Princess who had got straightened away for business rushed up and up and won the heat by a neck. Dora third, Nimble fourth, Chip fifth. In this heat Dora grabbed a boot and cut herself quite badly necessitating her withdrawal from the race. The fifth heat was a race from wire to wire between Princess and Winnie the latter winning by inches (Chip third Nimble fourth. Chip withdrawn. The sixth heat was again a race between Winnie and Princess Winnie a little in the lead, when about the seven eighth's Princess was carried off her feet and left her rival an easy winner. 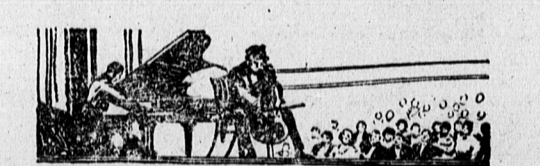

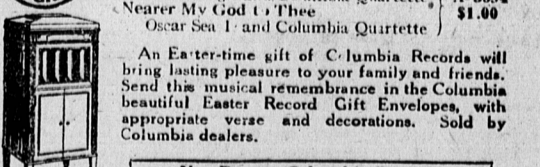
