On Thursday evening, May 3rd Mrs. Martin MacDonald entertained the members of this Institute and a number of visitors for the regular monthly meeting.

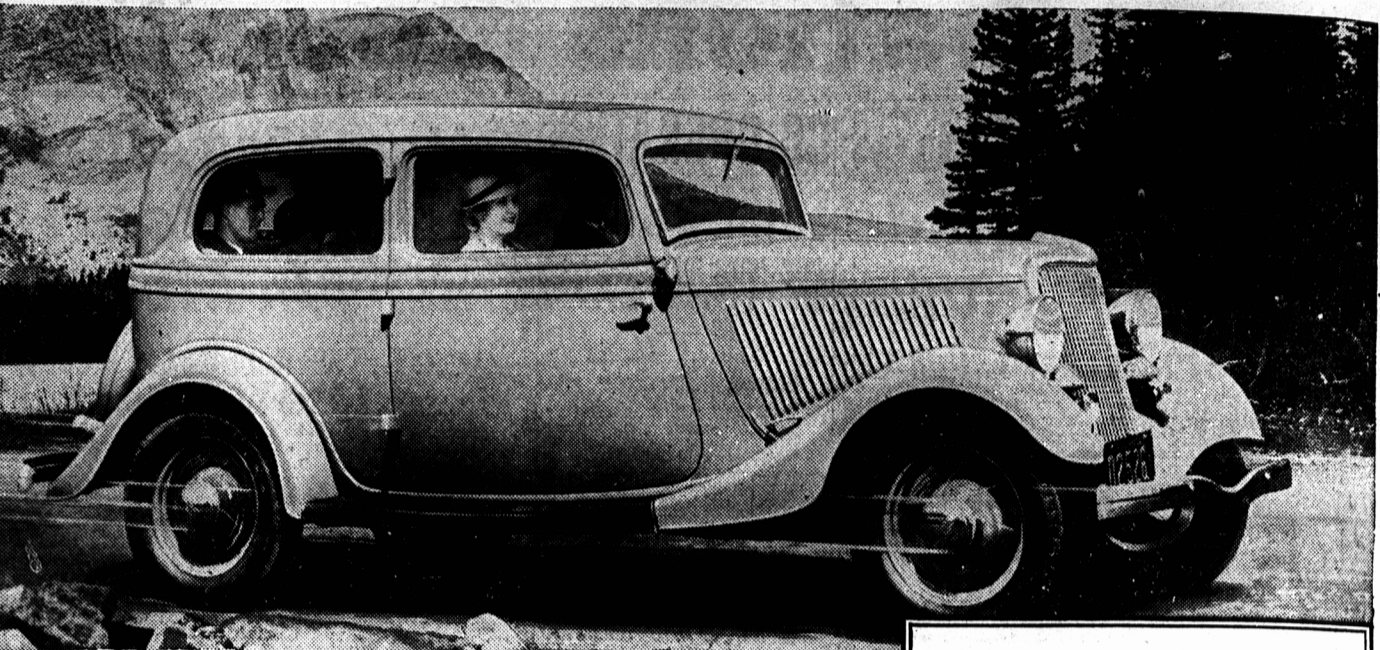
