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Answers Questions Re Pipeline

OTTAWA, July 9 (CP) - Prime Minister Mackenzie King said today in the House of Commons that under an agreement, the text of which cannot yet be revealed, the Government of the United States is bearing the cost of a pipeline from the Port Norman, N.W.T., oil wells to White Horse, N.S.

Canada was granting the right of way and securing sites required. Already Canada had agreed to facilitate the entry into the Dominion of labor and equipment required for such projects.

Royalties on the oil produced had been offered for Canada for the duration of the pipeline project. The United States will retain ownership of the pipeline until the end of the war when it will be offered for sale, with the Canadian Government having the first right to purchase.

Mr. King said that Hon. E. B. Hanson (Prog. Con. York-Sunbury) in a series of questions had asked the Prime Minister what the purpose of the pipeline would be the use of the pipeline and the refinery built after the war.

Mr. King replied that the pipeline would be used for the transport of oil to the refineries. He said that the pipeline would be built after the war.

Canada's Foreign Policy Discussed

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War Situation Last Night

Assuming that significant national holidays have psychological values even in the eyes of hard-headed military folk—and they have—Axis invasion nerves should be on edge next week.

Wednesday next, July 14, is Bastille Day. For 154 years that has been the date symbol of the birth of the Republic in France; the day Frenchmen have saluted as Canada do the first of July.

No day in all that year could be more fitting for a beginning to be made from within and without upon the grim business of liberating France again from tyranny and oppression. No day could so appeal to French hearts as sanctified by their faith in popular Government.

Noting within the gift of the people of France so testified to their faith in the experiment in free democracy a-borning across the Atlantic as their passing on of that token of their own yearning for liberty, equality and fraternity.

Axis invaders are well aware of that. Next week as the people of France, stirred to high hope by the dull, distant thunder of battle in the Mediterranean and the devastating rumble of Allied bombs blasting over the island outposts of ill-omened Italy, keep their eyes fixed on the memories of the day when the people of France so testified to their faith in the experiment in free democracy a-borning across the Atlantic as their passing on of that token of their own yearning for liberty, equality and fraternity.

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Russians Have Nazis Stopped

LONDON, July 10 (Saturday) (AP) - The Russian armies of the centre beat off savage German attacks all along the Orel and Kursk fronts yesterday, and destroyed 193 Nazi tanks and 49 planes in the great battle of attrition, the Soviet command announced early today.

The German dead, in two battle areas specifically mentioned, were nearly 5,000 for the day, Moscow declared in the regular midnight communiqué recorded here by the Soviet Monitor, thus bringing to about 40,000 the total German casualties for five days of violent action.

German losses in material also were rising to tremendous proportions: yesterday's destruction raised to 2,036 the number of enemy tanks thus far listed as knocked out, and to 904 the number of Nazi planes smashed since the beginning of the offensive.

The Germans themselves, in a broadcast propaganda report, said that "furious fighting" south of Orel where Nazi troops "could gain ground only inch by inch."

Further German advances—these too, without confirmation—were reported about Belgorod.

This German propaganda report put total Russian tank losses at more than 1,000 and Soviet plane losses at 1,000.

Soviet bombers pounded German troops, tank and convoy columns in the Orel and Kursk fronts in day and night attacks. One Moscow broadcast declared that in Thursday night's attacks the enemy "suffered heavy casualties" and the Red army air force emerged without loss of any aircraft for the second night in succession.

A military correspondent reported over the Berlin radio that "both sides are turning the battle of attrition into the greatest battle of attrition of the whole war."

The report claimed the Germans had advanced 35 miles north from Belgorod in the direction of Kursk and were widening their breach toward Novy Oskol.

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One Airman Killed In Crash Here

One airman was killed but three others were reported to have escaped without serious injury yesterday when a plane crashed and burned near the Charlottetown Airport.

The plane had just taken off when it began to lose altitude and crashed on the farm of Fred McCarrie, about a half-mile from the airport. It struck the ground not far from the residence of Alex Atnew. The accident occurred about 2:30 p.m.

Name of the man who lost his life, said to be the pilot, or of the other crew members had not been announced last night.
