HANDS OVER PLUNDER.

BERLIN, October 22.—The collection of gold all over the country is making rapid progress, all classes of the population competing in a great effort to replenish the national gold reserve.

Yesterday, the anniversary of Napoleon's defeat at Leipzig, the Crown Princess' chamberlain appeared at the depot in the Prussian diet building with a large quantity of gold and jewels, among which were beautiful bracelets, chains and brooches, which he handed to the officials as his mistress's contribution. Women of the Crown Princess' household also offered many handsome trinkets.

The public schools have taken up a collection through pupils who will be rewarded by iron medals and other decorations, according to their zeal.

BRITISH AND FRENCH HOLD CONFERENCE.

PARIS, Oct. 23.—At a conference of the political and military leaders of France and Great Britain, held at Boulogne on Friday the French leaders present were Finance Minister Ribot, General Joffre, Admiral Lavasseur, minister of marine, Gen. Roques, minister of war; M. Thomas, minister of munitions, and Leon Bourgeois and M. De Margerie, representing the French foreign office, and General Pelle, chief of staff to General Joffre.

France's Premier, Aquilino, Great Britain was represented by General Robertson, chief of staff; Gen. Haig, commander of the British armies in France; David Lloyd George, minister of war; Arthur J. Balfour, first lord of the admiralty, and Viscount Grey, secretary of state for foreign affairs.

The War Will Last Another Year

BRITISH FRONT in France, Oct. 21.—The war will last another year, according to the consensus of opinion among the British soldiers and their leaders. It is also the opinion of the Germans, if the views of prisoners count for anything. Before the grand offensive started a high authority informed the correspondent of the Associated Press that the German lines would not be broken this summer, and that slow operations, wearing down the Germans, would be inaugurated, and would probably last through another summer. With the approach of winter conditions which make military movements difficult, this officer recalled his prediction, and speaking of the situation today he said: "We know what the German resources were and what ours were, and the time required to force a decisive victory for our arms is a matter of calculation."

German Tone Changes.

German prisoners taken during the summer invariably spoke of peace being a certainty in the autumn. They regarded the Somme thrust as a final effort of the allies for a decision, and that after its peace would be made. Their tone has been entirely different of late. They recognize that it is a fight to a finish between the manpower and resources of the two foes, and that an ultimate decision will come from the fearful attrition on the western front, which now will know no intermission until the end. The Germans are determined to make every village on the western front a fortress, which will yield only when reduced to powder by shell fire, and every gully and center of marching is now to be secured their defensive against a critical defeat. At a period when the weather is adverse to offensive operations elsewhere the Germans are apparently concentrating every possible man and gun against Roumania. mans hope to crush Romania, so that when they have to face a common allied offensive in the spring they may not have to defend the immense length of the Roumanian frontier in addition to what they have had to defend this summer.

ENEMY MORALE LOWER.

It is a universal remark among the British that never has the morale of the prisoners varied more than now. "You will notice that we are always taking prisoners, and that the Germans get very few of ours," said a staff officer. "Though small parties of our men are bound to get into hazardous positions in this kind of intricate operations at close quarters, they die rather than yield. This shows their morals and the temper of the situation. Some Germans have never fought better, and some have never fought so badly as in the twenty Germans practically threw up their hands and walked into the British lines. But the soldiers who took them prisoners or their Com-manders had no illusion that these prisoners typified the condition of the German army as a whole. They were other Germans who were ready to fight with that ferocity which expects no quarter.

However, whether it is a German who throws up his hands on the approach of a British charge or the survivor of a score who fought to the death, the opinion as to the duration of the struggle remains the same. All believe that the war has entered a stage where no compromise is to be expected, and where victory will go to the side with the ability to stick the longest.

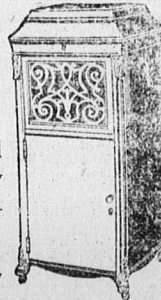
