HONG KONG, Aug. 19 (Special).—The federal general, Lung Chi-kuang, who is President Yuan Shih-kai's candidate for Governor of Canton, disembarked from a government gunboat at Hong Kong yesterday to take charge of the city.

Guerrilla fighting in which the rebels are being aided by pirates, is proceeding against government troops some miles beyond Canton. The guerrillas are prosecuting their warfare principally for the purpose of looting.

On one corner of a street in Canton the bodies of sixty-four persons who were killed in the fighting of Friday were found. All the men wore new uniforms. The Red Cross has been unable to reach the zone of fighting in Canton, where frightful conditions are reported to exist among the wounded owing to the great heat.

The Governor's Yamen, which was destroyed during the fighting, was the scene of wanton vandalism. The valuable furnishings, such as vases, blackwood screens and other articles, were taken to the streets and smashed. While stationary objects which could not be removed were battered to pieces with the butt ends of the guns of the rebels. Near the Yamen the body of a Chinese woman dressed in silks and having large pearls in her ears was found. She had been shot through the head.

The treasury building, which was damaged by shells, was looted. The rebels in their fighting are animated by the spirit of loot and not patriotism.

Wholesale executions in Canton are taking place daily. CONSTANTINOPLE, August 12—(Special)—The Porte today made an evasive reply to the receipt note of the Powers, in which a threat was made that the Powers would withdraw their moral and financial support from Turkey unless the Ottoman government ordered its troops to retire within the Enos-Midia line, in accordance with the treaty of London.

People write this office to know if News, Letters to Editors, etc., are charged for, and to all such there is but one reply—all items, etc., of a money making nature, even though they be somewhat of a new nature, are chargeable. For instance, the advance notice or notices of a concert, lecture, pie social, picnic, etc., are chargeable if there is an admission fee, silver collection, sale of pies or sale of food or refreshments, etc. Advance notices of purely religious services, even though a silver collection is to be taken up, are not chargeable. The particulars of any of the above, after they have been held, are, however, news and thus not chargeable. The news of the past, present or future business, which is still being conducted, is chargeable, if it is apparent that the object is to make the business more widely known and thus increase it. Versus accompanying death notices are also chargeable. Even items which are actual news and not chargeable but once in either Morning Daily or Evening Daily or both are chargeable for more than one insertion, as they are thus not news.

The above facts are given for the purpose of assisting persons who have items, etc., to mail to this office, so that delay and disappointment will be avoided.

ALWAYS CONSULT THE PHONE DIRECTORY.

Almost every day The Guardian receives orders by mail to insert news matter of an advertising nature. In most of these cases the senders, who are frequently not known to any member of the staff and who have no account in the advertising department, write "Please insert the following and oblige," thus apparently implying that they think the items will be inserted free. Only a few weeks ago a reader wrote asking that his advertisement of Farm for Sale be inserted free from day to day until he cancelled it, as he is a subscriber to The Guardian. In this connection it may be said that the subscription price is not sufficient to cover the actual cost of paper, ink, presswork, mailing, bookkeeping and other expenses of the Circulation department, and thus subscribers have no privileges of free advertisement and are on the same footing as non-subscribers. Seldom ever does the sender state whether the item is to appear in the Morning Daily or in the Evening Daily, whether for one or more insertions, either Daily, or in both, whether as a display advertisement, announcement, business local, classified, ad or otherwise.
