Trees were uprooted, telegraph poles blown down, windows broken and buildings unroofed by the wind, which blew at the rate of sixty miles an hour before the rain. Five deaths were reported as due to heat prostration.

MR. THOMAS TWEEDY.

In the death of Thomas Tweedy, Vernon River has lost its oldest resident and one of its most respected citizens. At the ripe age of 91 years, after but a few weeks of illness, he departed this life. When still a young man at 25 Mr. Tweedy under the earnest evangelistic appeal of Rev. F. Metherall gave his heart and life to God. Since then he has lived with the love of God and his fellowmen in his heart. He loved the place of prayer, and will be greatly missed as a church officer and worker. A helpful memory will remain of an exemplary life, a true friend, and faithful parent. The funeral service was conducted on Monday, Aug. 11, in the Vernon River Methodist Church by Rev. Henry A. EMMA EAMES.

Emma Eames Gorgoza, for two decades one of the most popular prima donnas of the English and American operatic stage, is Chinese by birth, having been born in Shing-hai forty-six years ago today, August 13, 1867. Her parents were American, however, her father being a lawyer in the international courts of Shanghai. The childhood of the great singer was spent in Boston, where she studied music and sang in church and other concerts. She went to Europe to complete her musical education, and made her debut at the Paris Grand Opera in 1889, in "Juliette." Two years later she sang before a noteworthy audience in Covent Garden, London, and was greeted with continued applause. That year also marked her marriage to Julian Story the artist, a son of W. W. Story, the sculptor and poet, and a grandson of Justice Joseph Story of the United States Supreme Court. For many years the painter and the singer lived happily together, but in 1907 the break came and Mme. Eames secured a divorce. A few years later she married Emilio de Geger Gorgoza, a famous baritone. Mr. Story also married again. A few months ago Mme. Eames announces her retirement from the professional stage, and declared that in the future she would sing only for charity.

BARCELONA STRIKE
BECOMES SERIOUS.

MADRID, Aug. 11.—The situation in Barcelona, where 90,000 workers are on strike and 337 factories are closed, is regarded in government circles as very grave, and it is expected that the city will be declared in a state of siege in view of the fact that the government regards the strike as a revolutionary movement. The socialists held a meeting here yesterday, and resolved to join hands with the Barcelona strikers. Newspapers in Barcelona have been ordered to suspend publication and the telegraph offices are guarded by police. Machine guns are mounted in the principal streets, and cavalry patrols the city.
