DEATH OF DRUGGIST
Mr. Neil Matheson of Summerside

HARTY FOR KINGSTON TAKES CARBOLIC ACID
From the Effects of Which He Dies a Few Minutes Later.

At 11.10 yesterday morning Neil Matheson for some 10 years a dispensing clerk in Mr. J. A. Gourlie's drugstore, Summerside, entered Mr. C. D. Rankin's drug store and asked Mr. Thos. Malone for a needle and some carbolic acid to use on a sore finger. Mr. Malone knowing him to be a druggist took him into the dispensing department and showed him where the carbolic acid bottle was kept. Then a customer entered the main store and Mr. Malone went out to attend on him. When he returned to the dispensing department Matheson told him he had taken two tablespoonfuls of acid, and requested Mr. Malone to send for a doctor. As quick as possible messages were despatched for doctors and Mr. Malone gave Matheson wine of ipecac and olive oil. Only a few minutes had elapsed when Dr. Kelly arrived but the poison had done its work as Matheson had collapsed a moment or two before the doctor's arrival. Drs. Kelly, Alley and H. D. Johnson worked with all their skill for upwards of an hour but were unable to resuscitate him. Investigation proved that Matheson had poured the acid out of a large blue bottle into a tumbler before taking it and that no acid was placed upon the finger. Dr. Conroy, coroner, after investigating the matter declared it a case of suicide and that an inquest was unnecessary. He turned the body over to Messrs. D. McMillan and Chas. Matheson consins of the deceased.

The deceased was a son of Mr. John Matheson, Summerside, and came to the city on Saturday to make application for a position on the medical corps which leaves shortly for South Africa. The young man made application to Mr. Rankin on Sunday evening asking him to use his influence with Major Johnson in regard to the securing of a position on the corps. This Mr. Rankin promised Matheson he would do. Mr. Rankin was also handed a letter by Matheson from Mr. Gourlie.

The unfortunate young man was in his 25th year and was a member of Oohrt Chataqua, I. O. F. and also a member of No. 3 Co. 82 Battalion. He has been engaged in the drug business for 10 years and commenced with Mr. J. A. Gourlie. Before leaving for Charlottetown he told Mr. Gourlie that if he could not pass to go to South Africa he would return again. His numerous friends in Summerside are at a loss to know why the fatality occurred. A sorrowing father and mother, one brother and three sisters survive.

The remains were forwarded yesterday afternoon by the 4.10 train to Summerside.
