DOMINION LIVE STOCK BRANCH The receipts of live stock on the market for the week ending Nov. 6th, 1921, are: 2539 hogs, 1544 hogs, and 47 sheep and lambs. There was also 575 calves through billing for export from the Port of Montreal and 152 cattle for export from Boston that passed through the Yards. The general average of the butcher cattle was somewhat better this week but in spite of this the market was slow with prices holding steady with those of last week. There were several loads of steers of good weight and of a fairly good quality on the market this week. The bulk of the better quality of butcher cattle of medium weight sold around \$5.00. Fat to medium butcher cattle sold from \$4.00 to \$4.25 and the common kinds down to \$2.50. The bulk of the yearling stuff that would weigh from 500 to 600 lbs. The cows were mostly all of the plain to medium order with quite a percentage of canners. A few of the best cows brought up to \$4.00 per cwt. but the bulk of the cows brought from \$2.50 to \$3.50. Big strong cows of sufficient fleshing to be used as cheap butcher beef brought as low as \$2.00. Cows and cutters brought from \$1.25 to \$3.00. Bologna hogs were about steady selling from \$2.00 for the light common ones up to \$2.50 for the heavy ones weighing 1000 lbs. or over. The percentages of boning or canning cattle is increasing. This week approximately 40 per cent of the total receipts was of this class. The calf market was strong with no particular advance in prices. There were no good veals offered a few fair veals brought from \$8.00 to \$10.00. Heavy veals brought from \$5.00 to \$7.00. Grassers were generally \$3.00. The lamb market was steady at \$7.75 to \$8.00 for top lambs, medium quality brought around \$7.00, and common lambs \$6.50 to \$7.00. Ewes were steady from \$3.00 to \$4.00. The hog market was a little stronger. The price of selects was practically steady through the week at \$9.00 to \$9.25. Towards the end of the week a few choice lots brought fifteen to twenty-five cents more. Sows are quoted at \$6.00 to \$6.50.

RICKARD FINDS WAY TO BEAT THE MOVIE LAW

CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—"Tex" Rickard promoter of the Jack Dempsey-Carpenter bout, "shadow boxed" with a few brief rounds today and then called for his seconds to come into the ring with the sponge. He lost \$500 and costs by admitting that he had brought moving picture films of the bout into Chicago in violation of the Interstate Commerce Act.

Rickard paid the fine with a smile and announced that the disputed films would be on display in one of the local cinema houses by the end of the week.

"My lawyers have looked into the case and can find no law forbidding the exhibition of the pictures once they are brought into the State," he said. "That being the case, we shall exhibit them."

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—In an effort to recover money said to have been loaned Tex Rickard for promotion of the Johnson-Jeffries bout in 1910 and other big sporting events, Frank D. Armstrong, broker, today sought to have the promoter and two corporations in which he is interested thrown in to the hands of a receiver.

Upon Armstrong's application, Supreme Court Justice Hotchkiss signed an order requiring Rickard, the Madison Square Garden Corporation and the Madison Square Garden Sporting Club, Inc., to show cause next Monday why a receiver should not be appointed for their interests.

In his complaint Armstrong stated he advanced Rickard \$100,000 to aid in promoting the Johnson-Jeffries contest, also that he helped the promoter, which he managed the Garden-Jeffries bout in Goldfield, Nevada, and when he obtained the lease on Madison Square Garden.

The two corporations named in the complaint, Armstrong alleged, owed Rickard \$290,000, but Rickard told him he had no money to pay his debts.

"FLAT AS ANY PANCAKE IS THIS OLD WORLD OF OURS"

Shouts Wilbur Glen Voliva From Zions Lofty Towers—It Has Rugged Rim of Ice so Sailors Won't Fall Off—Wilbur Scoffs at Gravitation—That's a Dream That Bounced on Isaac Newton's Bean.

Zions, Oct. 3.—Zions school teacher, Wilbur Glen Voliva, the overseer of the colony, is president, have adopted the new theories of a flat world and the absence of gravitation, and the 1,000 grade and high school pupils believe in it implicitly, according to their teachers.

The public school maintained by the state board of education and attended by the children of non-members of Voliva's Christian Church Apostolic church still teaches, however, that the world is a globe moving through limitless space and that it was the attraction of gravity which caused the apple to fall on Isaac Newton's head. At the Zion schools the new course of study teaches that: The earth is a flat circular world with a north pole in the exact centre, no south pole, and surrounded by a wall of ice which keeps venturesome mariners from falling off the rim.

That the earth has no motion, but remains stationary in space. That the sun is not millions of miles away, but is really a little over 32 miles across and only 3,000 miles from the earth.

Why Brick Won't Stay Up... That the law of gravitation is a fallacy and when objects are thrown into the air they continue to rise until the force which propelled them is expended, and then fall back to earth because they are heavier than air.

A standard map of the world, on Christopher's projection is used in the schools to demonstrate the flat world theory. This may, which is used by navigators and scientists in making time and longitude calculations, differs from the usual Mercator's projection familiar in other schools, in that it shows the earth as it would look to an observer directly above the north pole, with the continents and seas projected on a flat plane. As a result the north pole is in the centre, an instead of a south pole the Antarctic regions are indicated by a white ring about the outer circumference of the circle. This, according to Voliva, is the barrier which keeps mariners from falling off the edge of his flat world.

The Christopher projection was discovered by the south pole and before much was known about the Antarctic regions, so only a bare outline of portions of the southern ice continent is shown. Miss Mary Thompson, principal of the Zion school system, and an ardent believer in the Voliva theories, has propounded a question which she believes will trip scientists and navigators. Showing on her flat map that the tropic of

"The students in Zion schools," she says, "grasp the theory of the flat earth readily because their minds are not full of globular earth teaching such as older folks have had drilled into them.
