AUTO NON-GLARE LENSES.—The attention of auto owners is called to the Regulation under "The Motor Vehicle Law" of this Province recently passed by the Lieutenant Governor, in Council, requiring non-glare lenses to be used on auto lamps. The Regulation is as follows:—"No auto lamps shall be used or displayed on any motor vehicle while being driven in this Province unless such lamps are protected by proper non-glare lenses, approved by the Provincial Secretary; and no motor vehicle shall be registered or operated in this Province without being so equipped." "Non compliance with this Regulation shall be deemed an offence against "The Motor Vehicle Law" and the Regulations thereunder, and shall render the offender liable, if he be the owner of the car, to cancellation of his car permit, and if he be the driver thereof, only to cancellation of his license as operator or chauffeur, or, in either case, to a fine of ten dollars for each and every offence, or to both cancellation of permit or license and fine." As motor vehicles already registered must be registered again on or before the 1st May, 1919, these lenses should be procured in due time.

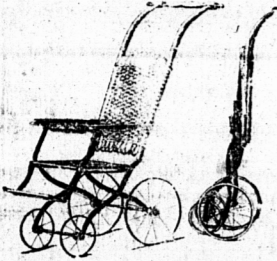
