Sheep Problems of Australia

(By British United Press) SYDNEY, N. S., July 21.—Drought, enemy of the Australian sheepmasters, forced a Central Queensland owner to spend 19,000 sheep, all that remained of 70,000 after two years' dry spell, 300 miles to a district where feed was good.

He was beset by one of the many problems which the Australian wool grower has to conquer in order to make domestic produce the most sought after in the world. His sheep could not travel back on foot, as they had gone, because they could not exist on the parched country.

Then motor-trucks came to the sheep-owner's rescue. All such available trucks in Winton and Longreach, Central Queensland townships were engaged to carry the sheep the 300 miles from their agistment area to their owner's property. Three hundred miles of the worst roads in Queensland. One-ton trucks carried 50 per trip, two-ton trucks 80, and four-ton trucks, with two tiers of crates, carted 150.

It was a daring experiment, but it succeeded. Losses were remarkably low. The sheep cost a dollar and a half per head to transport, but they were worth it, for a couple of months hence each will deliver up four dollars' worth of wool each. If they had died, they would not have been worth half a dollar apiece.

Whereupon the Commissioner of Police ordered that the man should be undressed and all his clothes inspected. An additional 2,000 francs in 10 and 20-franc notes were found in his shirt, and 1,000 francs in his hat.
