Organized Clubs Real Factors in Youth Training

TORONTO, Dec. 17 (CP)—Taylor Statten, retiring at the year-end after 40 years as a leader in boys' work, believes the "dynamic of religion should be supported by the revelations of science" if the dream of a society "dominated by Christian ideals of equality of opportunity in the pursuit of happiness" is to be fulfilled.

"Religion should be the best ally science has," said Mr. Statten after the announcement of his retirement from the general secretaryship of the Toronto Young Men's Christian Association. "The root of the religion and the root of science are the same—an obedience to a certain law."

Drawing on his long experience, he outlined the philosophy of boys' work and stressed the value of the small neighborhood club and the well-organized summer camp as the constructive answers to the "destructive and dilapidated tendencies" evident in youth today.

"The essential facts about the boy, his social setting and the psychological laws which govern his growth in knowledge, skill and character, indicate that the natural group of playmates, with a friendly adult to act as a counsellor and a basis for the most effective type of work with boys."

In both club and camp it was important for leaders to know that a "socially desirable Christian character is produced through a demonstration of the religious significance of many decisions is clearly revealed."

Need Skilled Leaders

Boys could never be taught this lesson in "organization where the rules, procedure and standards are all set by adults." They should be given the opportunity to learn the essentials of democracy through practice, with skilled leaders endeavoring to bring concrete Christian principles to bear on the choices they make "in the detailed specific situations of their lives."

Mr. Statten was in Erinville, Ont., in 1882 and educated there and at Streetville High School. He came to Toronto in 1890 and in 1902 started his career as boys' work secretary of Toronto Y.M.C.A. At present he holds the position of chairman of the World's Alliance Y.M.C.A. Boys' Work Committee which has its headquarters in Geneva.

Mr. Statten developed the Canadian standard efficiency tests for boys, which later became the basis for the National Boys' Work Board. During the First Great War he was director of "Soldiers of the Roll" for the Canada Food Board.

After retiring, he will devote all his energy to training summer camp leaders in the "Aimek" and "Wapomeo" camps which he organized in 1910 at Centre Lake in Algonquin Park.

The financial report given by the treasurer, Miss Craig, showed a balance from last year of \$68.11. This year's receipts \$170.87, expenditure \$144.76 leaving a balance of \$80.22.

Mrs. Percy MacMundo and Mrs. Erskine MacMundo were appointed to take charge of the program for the next two months. The following committee volunteered to clean and all the school floor. Mrs. Picketts, Mrs. Court, Mrs. Moore, Mrs. Laird and Mrs. E. MacMundo.

R. C. A. F. Mess Hall At Dawson Creek Burns
