TEACHERS WILL GET INCREASES

On the Casting Vote of Mayor Kelly—Many Matters of Importance were Discussed at the Regular Monthly Meeting of the City Council Last Night—Economy is the Council's Watchword.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last night. The returns from Ward 2 showing the election of D. J. Riley were read. After routine business communications were read from the Charlottetown Mutual Fire Insurance Co., asking for exemption from taxation as they were formed for protection only; from E. S. Stewart, Secretary of the School Board, announcing that the term of T. C. James as School Trustee expires in June next; from Rollo and Silsby Hosiery and the Hook and Ladder companies, stating their satisfaction in the accident insurance furnished by the company represented by Geo. Holbrook; from Queen street merchants asking that a door be placed in the centre of the west wall of the market; from the police officers asking for an increase in salaries; from Hyndman & Co., offering accident insurance for \$105 on the firemen; from fire underwriters stating that the readjustment of the insurance rates would be considered on the 16th; from the Natural History and Antiquarian Society asking for a public museum for storing much material already accumulated; from Oriabar street residents directing attention to their street and sidewalks; from the directors of the Exhibition Association asking for a grant; and from John Bolger asking for a remedy for the drains into his cellar. Mayor Kelly reported on his visit to Ottawa to attend the Convention for the Prevention of Tuberculosis and his consultation in conjunction with Dr. Alley with a company who were asking inducements for building a street railway here and giving electric lighting. The concessions asked for were very reasonable and they had said they would send an engineer to the city shortly. Councillors Hooper and Paton referred in commendatory terms to the Mayor's report and their motion accepting it was unanimously carried. J. D. Seaman on behalf of the City Teachers presented a petition signed by over 1000 citizens asking for the increases requested by the teachers to date from Jan. 1904. Councillor Brown asked if there was not dissatisfaction with the scale of increase which gave Prince Street \$375 while West Kent only got \$365 and Queen Square only \$30. Mr. Seaman replied that there was more dissatisfaction because of the application of the scale of increases than

MORE FIGHTING IN FAR THIBET

Six Hours Battle Near Karo Pass—200 Killed

British Victorious with Small Loss—Body of Wentz Found—Ex-Finance Minister of Russia Dead.

LATE FINANCE MINISTER DEAD. LONDON, May 9—(Special)—M. Flehve, lately Minister of Finance of Russia, died today at St. Petersburg.

WENTZ'S BODY FOUND. RICHMOND, Vt., May 9—(Special)—The body of Edward L. Wentz, son of a Philadelphia millionaire, was found today near where he was last seen and in a place previously searched over.

This and the fact that the body is in a good state of preservation heightens the mystery of his disappearance.

ANOTHER FIGHT IN THIBET.

BRITISH CAMP, KARO PASS, May 9.—A stiff fight took place on Sunday to drive the Thibetans from their position two miles below the Pass. It lasted six hours.

ENEMY FOUGHT BRAVELY.

The Thibetans numbering fifteen hundred, held their position with great tenacity and lost nearly two hundred men before they were expelled.

THE BRITISH LOSS SMALL.

The British losses were Captain Bethune and three men killed, and 21 men wounded. A snowstorm prevailed throughout the fight.

Brown thought Mr. Bolger as well as all the other residents adjoining had a grievance. Councillor Reddin spoke to the same effect and the Surveyor was instructed to report on the matter.

Councillor Hooper moved, seconded by Councillor Paton, that in the opinion of the Council, the increases in the salaries of the teachers shall take place from Sept. 1st, 1904, and the request be referred back to the School Board for readjustment.

Councillor Riley moved, seconded by Councillor Alley, that the request for increases lie on the table.

Councillor Brown said he would vote against the increase because it was a discrimination against two schools in favor of one. In Prince Street all get the maximum increases while in Queen Square and West Kent the increases are not made to all the teachers.

Councillor Hooper thought the distribution of the money was a matter for School Board, not for the Council. He said Prince Street had teachers who were engaged for a longer period and that the other schools thus obtaining a larger increase.

Councillor Alley thought a great many citizens were not in favor of the increase and many had asked him not to support it.

Councillor Reddin was in favor of increase, he had no course but to vote for the amendment.

The amendment was defeated on the casting vote of the Mayor with the following vote:—

Ayes:—Riley, Reddin, Alley and Brown. Nays:—Hooper, Prowse, Rogers, Paton. The main motion that the increase be granted from Sept. 1st 1904 was unanimously carried.

The City Clerk was authorized to advertise \$30,000 city debentures for 30 years bearing 4% interest.

After some discussion it was agreed that Prince Street from Kent to Fitzroy; Great George as many be agreed upon and Pownal from Water to Euston be macadamized, Councillors Hooper and Rogers voting against the last work at the present time.

A letter was read from Capt C.B. Murley calling attention to the inadequate state of the Hook and Ladder apparatus.

Dysentery, Typhus and Smallpox in the Great Russian Camp—100 Doctors Telegraphed for—Czar Mobilizes His Reserves

New Chwang Being Evacuated—Some Improbable Reports.

URGENT CALL FOR DOCTORS.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 9—(Special)—It is announced that urgent telegrams have been received from Mukden for a hundred doctors.

SERIOUS OUTBREAK OF DISEASES. Typhus fever, dysentery and smallpox have broken out among the Russian troops.

AN IMPROBABLE STORY. It is reported that Russian forces, number unknown, accompanied by Manchurian mounted bandits have crossed the Yalu far above Wiju and have occupied Chang Jin.

RUSSIANS LEAVING NEW CHWANG.

LONDON, May 9—(Special)—There is practically no news from the seat of war today.

All advices are that the Russians were evacuating New Chwang.

Some guns and troops at least have been sent away and the Japanese may now be in possession.

RUSSIA MOBILIZING RESERVES.

Russia's order for the mobilization of her reserves has caused something of a sensation in that country.

crossed the Yalu River far above Wiju, the other from London that the Japanese may now be in possession of New Chwang. It is quite possible however that the Russians are now leaving New Chwang with a view to concentrating at Liao Yang forty miles further north on the railway line, the point toward which their defeated army is retreating from the Yalu River. So far as known there is no Japanese force within fifty miles of New Chwang. The news of most serious import is the outbreak of dysentery, smallpox and typhus fever at Mukden. We recently referred to the shocking conditions of filth, bad water and utter absence of sanitary precautions at Mukden. With the approach of warm wet weather the place may become a veritable plague spot to the large Russian force encamped there. In war, disease usually claims more victims than the sword, rifle and cannon. There is no further news from the Japanese force landed near Port Arthur. It is expected that they will rapidly close in upon that town. There is something more than a possibility that Dalny may not be very strongly defended. If Port Arthur is to be taken Dalny will probably be the first to fall. The report that the Russian reserves are being mobilized indicates something like a panic in Russian military circles.]
