THE KING'S COUNTY GUARDIAN

The death occurred at Lower Montserrat
on Saturday night of Mrs. Davidson,
widow of the late Rev. F.T. Davidson. There
is widespread sorrow felt in this instance
for it is but a few months ago that the
deceased's husband died.

A most complimentary address was
presented to the Rev. E. A. McPhee,
Supt. Minister of the "Dunlop" I.O.G.
Lodge on behalf of the Presbyterians,
Sabbath and Methodist congregations of
Dunlop and Bridgetown, on the 21st of
Feb. 1907, when he was leaving for Hazel
Brook, his new field of labor. Though
Mr. McPhee was taken unawares he
made a very felicitous reply, expressing
his pleasure he had in laboring among the
people; the many acts of kindness they
had shown him; his pleasure and interest
in the prosperity of the Lodge; the kindly
feelings existing between himself and the
members of the other denominations;
and his regret that these happy associa-
tions, of which he would always carry
with him sweet recollections, were now
coming to an end. He thanked them for
their flattering address, of which he felt
he was unworthy, and for their kindly
gift, not for its intrinsic value but as an
expression of their good will towards him;
and also for their kindly reference to Mrs.
McPhee. Both he and Mrs. McPhee
could heartily reciprocate the sentiments
expressed in the address.

TEMPERANCE WORK AT KENSINGTON

Important Meeting Recently
Held In C.M.B.A. Hall
There

A large meeting of Kensington and
vicinity was held in the C.M.B.A. Hall on
Wednesday, Feb. 27. There was a well
filled house.

John Anderson was elected chairman.
After a few opening remarks he called
on the Rev. Mr. Gills who gave a very
interesting and appropriate address. He
was followed by Rev. Mr. Gough and Rev.
Mr. Nicholls.

Mr. Stirling spoke of the loss sustained
by the temperance cause in general when
Dr. Darrach gave up his drugstore. The
discussion then became general several
of the audience taking part. Dr. Darrach
spoke at length, followed by Wm. Brown,
Margate, who spoke pointedly in respect
to the liquor traffic in the village. Mr.
Baker moved a series of resolutions second-
ed by Geo. Brown, that provoked a warm
discussion participated in by Messrs D.
McKenzie, J. F. S. Apple, Geo. R. Mac
Mahon, Nicholas Stirling and others.
These resolutions were then put separa-
tely and with few changes were
carried as follows:

Resolved, that we express our satisfaction
on with the Prohibition Act passed by
our Legislature, and with the efforts of the
Attorney General to make the law
effective and have it enforced.

Resolved, that we express our approval
with the just and careful manner in
which Supt. Magistrate Wright
dealt with the cases that have come be-
fore our notice, and we are pleased with
the faithful and energetic manner in
which the County Inspector Gough has
prosecuted the cases.

Resolved, that we recommend that the
proposed amendments to the Prohibition
Law proposed by the Temperance
Alliance of this County be passed by the
Legislature at this session. It is also
that a committee of three from this meet-
ing be appointed to wait on the Executive
H. A. Leslie and express to him the dis-
satisfaction of the meeting at the manner
in which he has performed his duty
during the past year, receive his explana-
tion, and report to the next temperance
meeting to be held here in the near fu-
ture.

The reference to the manner Dr. Darrach
had conducted the drugstore here for a
period of thirty years was expressed by a
resolution passed unanimously which set
forth the appreciation of the people of
Kensington and vicinity of his careful-
ness to not only observe the letter only
but the very spirit of our temperance
laws.
