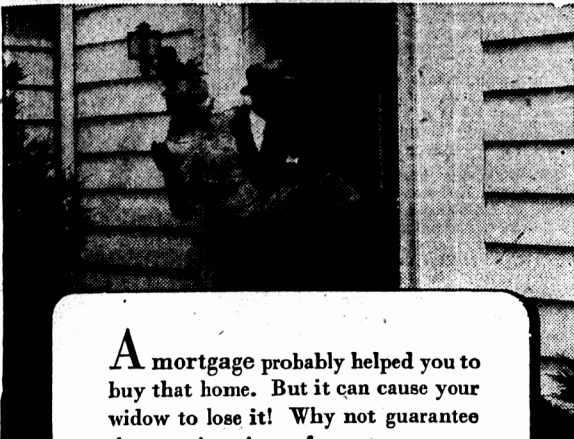


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REMEMBER WHEN

Pictou Lobster Carnival Three Day Affair

PICTOU—The big Lobster Carnival—Carnival of the fisherfolk—is a three day affair this year, but Wednesday is the big day of the three. The morning opens with pipe and brass bands giving a concert at ten o'clock at the C.N.R. station stage. The official opening will be at 10.30 with a special speaker yet to be named, and government officials in dress. Trap building contests will take place immediately afterwards. The morning ceremonies will cease at 11.30 to be followed by the parade of lobsters at the festive Lobster Gardens in Custom House Square, or to view the Lobster Fisheries exhibits of the Government nearby. The parade gets under way, and a feature this year will be the beautiful Sea Chariot upon which will ride His Majesty King Neptune and his Maids of the Sea. The parade will arrive at the C.N.R. station stage at 1.30 where King Neptune and His Maids will be escorted to the throne by scarlet clad Mounties. At 1.45 the parade of the Lobster Gardens will be carried out. King Neptune will present the fisherman who secured the biggest lobster of the season and King Lobster will be crowned. Maids of the Sea, representing various towns and villages will be a colorful part of the ceremonies. After the half hour broadcast of the ceremonies, King Neptune will be escorted to a seat of honor on the new huge wharf where the fishermen's boat races, starting at two P.M. will run until 4 P.M. interspersed with a variety of other tawdry pulling. At 4 P.M. prizes will be presented by King Neptune to the successful fishermen, and an air-sea rescue demonstration by the R.C.A.F. will take place on this on the water front which will be amply covered by loud speaker systems. When activities on the waterfront are in progress, Highland Dancing will be carried on at the station stage.

INDIAN SHIP CANAL

POONA, India — (CP) — A plan for a 30-mile ship canal from Calcutta to Diamond Harbor on the Bay of Bengal is being studied here. Other plans for Calcutta include more docks and warehouses for the port, one of the biggest in the East with nearly 30,000 workers.

Harry Giddings, internationally known owner, breeder and trainer of race horses and fighting cocks, died recently from a heart condition. Born in Austria, the son of the late Harry Giddings, also a famed horseman, he came to Oakville, Ont., as a child and lived there all his life. Against his parents' wishes, Harry chose to follow in his father's footsteps and in his day developed and trained many famous Canadian horses, among them eight King's Plate winners. Plagued by ill health, Giddings had planned to retire this fall, sell out his fine home and farm in Oakville, and move to California.

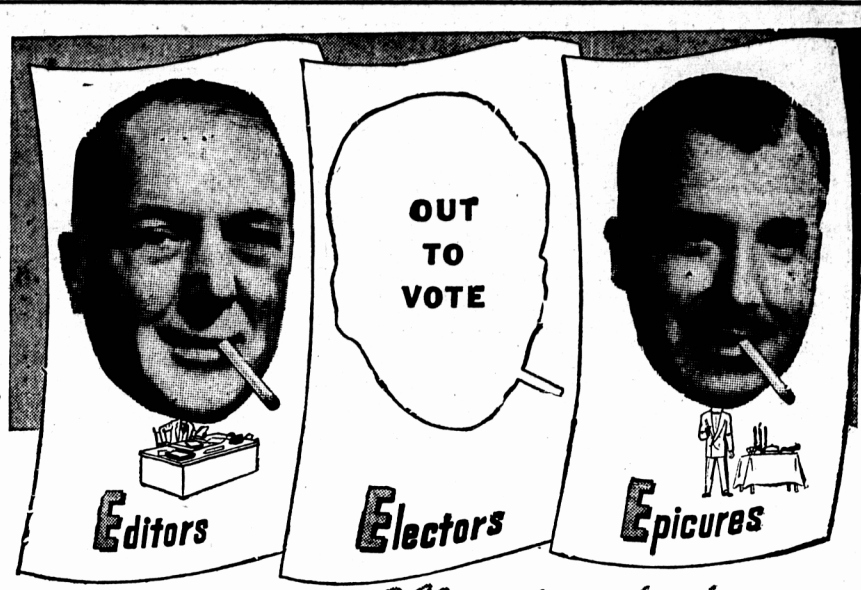

New Edition Of Canada Year Book

OTTAWA, June 26 — (CP) — A fat, 1,300-page study of Canada's latest progress through time rolled off the press today. It was the 1948-49 edition of the Canada Year Book, one of the Dominion's annual best-sellers, telling the story of the country's advance through the years since 1871. A.E. Millward of Ottawa, its 58-year-old editor, said the current edition is one of the most comprehensive reviews of its kind. "The Canada Year Book is always a best seller," added Mr. Millward who has been working on year books for the last 20 years. "We print about 15,000 in English and about 1,500 in French and except for some 4,000 which we distribute to institutions in the world,

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
