### Bracken Scores King Campaign

(By The Canadian Press)

**VANCOUVER, May 29.**—The last man in Canada who should charge the Progressive Conservative party with making a deal with Quebec Province is Prime Minister Mackenzie King who maintained himself in office through his deals with Quebec, John Bracken, national Progressive Conservative leader, said tonight.

Mr. King was again attempting to hang on to power by using Quebec as a stepping stone, but the Canadian people now understood his methods and would repudiate his tactics at the polls June 11, said Mr. Bracken in a speech prepared for delivery at a political rally here.

Other speakers included Lt.-Col. Cecil Merritt, V.C., party candidate for Vancouver-Burrard, and Howard Green, party candidate for Vancouver South.

Mr. Bracken, continuing his cross-country Dominion election tour said:—

1. He was not supporting Mayor Camille Houde of Montreal, independent candidate in Montreal St. Mary's.

2. The Progressive Conservative party has only 27 candidates in Quebec, compared with 60 Liberal candidates.

3. The present Government's manpower policy had placed a stigma on the French-Canadian people.

4. The Progressive Conservative party in government would not allow Japanese to reside in British Columbia.

5. The party, if elected, would take steps at once to provide homes for veterans at fair rental until such time as they are able to obtain permanent homes.

#### Recalls King Record

Mr. Bracken said that for 20 years prior to the war, Mr. King, to obtain his political fortunes with a minority, blinded the people of Canada to the true state of conditions, by telling them that Canada would never again become involved in a European conflict.

"I understand it has been recently stated that I am supporting Camille Houde in the Province of Quebec," said Mr. Bracken. "Any such statement is a lie."

"It is just another example of the usual tactics of the Liberal party under Mr. King's leadership and their subservient partisan press in striving to maintain power by using Quebec as the stepping stone."

"Let me remind you that the Progressive Conservative party has only 27 candidates in the Province of Quebec—the Liberal party has 60 out of a possible 65."

"It is well-known that the party I lead stands for equality of service and sacrifice, in time of war as well as in time of peace. Is any better evidence required as to which party is catering to the

### Unequal Burden

The first price the Canadian people were paying for Mr. King's manpower policy was the unequal burden of human sacrifice which the policy placed on every home and every community where men and women generously enlisted for war.

"The second price we paid for his policy is the stigma it has placed upon French-Canadians in the eyes of their fellow citizens in Canada and our allies outside."

This stigma is undeserved by French-speaking Canadians who have enlisted. For that result, the Government alone, not French-Canadians generally, must bear

the responsibility.

"The third price we paid for the Government's policy is the lamentable state of disunity into which this country has fallen in recent years. It is the disunity arising from the failure of the Government to require a measure of equality of sacrifice."

Col. Merritt said one of the chief issues in the election was whether Canadians should adopt free enterprise or state dictation as their basic economic policy.

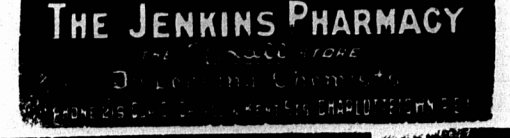
