CANADIAN MINT WORKING HALF-TIME

OTTAWA, July 22—The demand from the banks for new silver and copper currency has considerably fallen off during the past few weeks and in consequence the royal mint has been obliged to very considerably restrict its output, and instead of minting three tons of copper coins per week, the output is now only half that amount, and no silver coins are being minted. A few English sovereigns have been minted at Ottawa this year, but so far no Canadian gold pieces have been coined. It is expected that this season's crop movement will stimulate the demand for new coins.
