As a matter of fact, as the Guardian stated in the first place, the policemen handled the man with all the gentleness possible; and furthermore Chief Cameron exerted himself to find out the man's friends and procure enough money to have him sent safely that same day to his home, which is in Prince County.

The man was a very old man who had come to Charlottetown from the mainland, and was evidently not in a condition to be allowed to go alone. This appears to be a case where the police and the Chief have acted with a great deal of kindness and discrimination. At the same time it does not alter the fact that a "jigger" should be at the command of the police.
