OF LOCAL INTEREST.—The work that Canada has done and is doing for her wounded soldiers in the way of hospital treatment and re-education is fully set forth in "Canada's Work for Wounded Soldiers," a five reel serial produced by the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment and shortly to be exhibited in theatres throughout Canada. It is little realized by the Canadian public that Canada leads the world in this work, her system having been copied by Australia, and more recently by the United States. The film shows every phase of the work, from the deck of a hospital ship in a Canadian port to the shop, office, or farm where the returned soldier is working, after having been educated at government expense. Any man whose war wounds prevent him from resuming his pre-war occupation is entitled to such education, and is trained in a suitable trade or profession. Some of the most interesting scenes in the film are those illustrating occupational therapy—where men are encouraged to use injured muscles or members by being given some simple and useful work such as carpentry and woodcarving, which are found to be particularly beneficial. Of special interest, not only to the general public, but to medical men are the scenes showing the use of the apparatus at Hart House, Toronto, and other places, for restoring flexibility and power to arms and fingers made impotent by war wounds. The film took eight months to complete, and the camera man travelled from coast to coast to photograph it.

Describes Life in France

The following letter has been received by Mrs. Alex Buchanan, Clyde from her brother Donald MacDonald, who, although, 52 years of age, gave up the comforts of home to fight the battles of Liberty in France and Flanders. France, July 9th, 1918

Dear Sister Kate:—You will no doubt think that I have completely forgotten you, having not written to you since coming to this war cursed land, but let me tell you truly that I haven't, for many many times you and Alex and family are in my thoughts for all I have not written to you. Some way it seems hard for me to get started to write to any except to dear Ellie and the children. I trust that you will overlook my neglect for believe me the spirit was always willing; but the flesh kept putting it off.

Well Kate I hardly know what to write you, I suppose you know as much about this place as I can tell you, for no doubt you hear from poor Sander and he tells you all that can be told. I came across to England with him on the same boat from Canada and believe me I was more than pleased to meet the dear lad. We were camped quite close to each other for about two months in England and I have not seen him since that, about a year and ten months ago, but let me tell you that I think he is a real fine lad with good habits and oh Kate I often think of him and it brings the tears to my eyes when I think of what may befall him like many others before this awful strife is over. Oh but I do trust that he will be kept safe and restored to you when it is all over and then you will really be proud of him.

Well I may tell you that I am in a forestry Corps in France. Have been since a year ago last April and I like it fairly well. They would not pass me for the trenches so I am tailoring for the Coy, a very good job. Work along as I please, no one bothers me and I am my own boss at it and here I will give you my address as we are supposed to put it in the body of the letter and not at the beginning or finish. D. McDonald, No. 715970 34 Co., Canadian Forestry Corps, No. 2 District, France.

We can hear the roar of the big guns day and night where we are, but out of range so at present at least I am quite safe here. This is the third forest that we have been in since we came across. We came to this one about a month ago. There are about two hundred in the Co. and they have five hundred prisoners Germans working. The forest is about two and a half miles square all beech and oak. Some of the trees are seven feet on the stump and they are cut close to the ground. I tell you they are some trees. The Germans do all the work each man has five prisoners and all he has to do is to see that they do the work. I was out working five of them for two weeks when I came to this place first till they got a little shop fixed up for me and I liked it great. Such beech nuts you never saw in your life. It will be great in the fall when they get ripe. The Co. has a saw mill in the forest too and they saw about forty thousands feet a day. The mill was imported from Robbs Foundry, Amherst, dear old Amherst. It's a great country for apples and fruit of all kinds and is just covered with fruit trees, even the woods, and all I have seen of it is good farming country with villages and towns every mile or two but their methods of farming are a hundred years behind good old Canada. The climate is fine. I never wore an over coat last winter and only light underwear. I don't care very much for the people as there is something about them that don't appeal to me

at all and oh how I wish I was back home again with dear Ellie and the kiddies. I get so homesome sometimes Kate that I nearly die just to get a glimpse at their faces. I am going to try and get a furlough. I think this will be all this time. Write to me as soon as you can and I will answer it at once on receipt. So now I will close with the best of love and good wishes to you dear sister and dear old Alex B and all the children. I remain your affectionate brother DONALD
