RESUME EVIDENCE OF IN KINRADE INQUEST

TORONTO, March 13.—The Kinrade murder inquest was resumed at Hamilton Thursday with a large crowd of sensation seekers present. The first witness was Mrs. Kinrade, mother of the murdered girl. Blackstock led her on by questions concerning her early married life and referred to Florence's engagement to B. M. Wright. She said she was opposed to Florence going to Richmond church and Ethel also opposed it, the reason being that the girls were inseparable and the family did not want them separated but they had a different sort of objection coming when Florence said she was going on the stage at Portmouth, and although the witness and Ethel opposed it, Kinrade gave his consent. Mrs. Kinrade took a long time in answering the question of whether her son Ernest had been at his father's home shortly before the murder. She finally replied in the affirmative and said that he was there on business. She could not say accurately how long he was here before the murder took place, but it might have been three days or a week.

AFTERNOON ON TRAGEDY. On the afternoon of the murder witness left the house to go downtown to complain to the police of the actions of tramps. Before going to the police office she visited the Workman's Home to leave word for the inhabitants of that resort that they need expect no more charity from her. Mrs. Kinrade was on the stand for two hours. Miss Gertrude Kinrade, the youngest child of the Kinrade family, was next called and testified that there were never any firemen in the house

money from her room, and in passing her sister's door called out "Lock yourself in." She first said she called this in a whisper, but later declared she did it loudly. She admitted she could have called for help from the balcony, and threw up the window to go so, but changed her mind and went down stairs. Miss Kinrade said she next ran down stairs and pushed \$10 into the burglar's hands. She heard shots and went to jump out of the box window in the back parlor. The man grabbed her and pulled her back. She did not remember whether she really got outside. She ran through the kitchen into the back yard and down to the fence, intending to climb over, but again changed her mind. Re-entering the house she saw her sister on the floor dying, and was again confronted by the man, who was in the front hallway near the diningroom. He warned her to keep quiet. She dashed by him and across the street, being fired at as she went, and going to Mrs. Hickey's back door gave notice of the tragedy. She said she did not recognize the noises when she was upstairs to be shot. The man had plenty of opportunity to shoot her before he did fire.

The question, "Are you sure you did not know that man?" repeated over and over again by Blackstock, finally brought Miss Kinrade to tears, and caused an adjournment of the Kinrade inquest at a quarter to two this morning, after a most trying examination in the crowded court room. "Miss Kinrade, who was this man?" "I don't know." "Did you ever see that man before?" "I never saw him before." "You can give us no light on that?" "You understand the solemnity of that?" "I never saw him before," gasped the half-fainting girl.

"Did you ever see that person before?" persisted the crown investigator. The witness again closed her eyes and threw her head back and slowly shook it, then answered "No." "Are you sure you never saw him before?" "No." "Couldn't tell who he is? Then I won't ask you any more questions tonight."

The above were the principal passages between Miss Florence Kinrade, sister of Ethel Kinrade, who was foully murdered in her home on Herkimer street, Hamilton on the 25th of February, and G. T. Blackstock, K. C. Crown Counsel Blackstock said today he did not think it necessary to recall Miss Kinrade.

DR. McNICHOL The next witness was Dr. McNichol, who was among the first to reach the house. He was coroner and the first jury empanelled, but was deposed, the police authorities thinking his evidence might lead to developments.

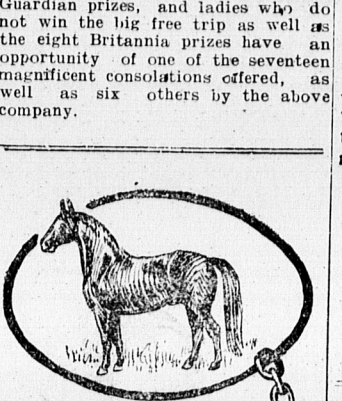

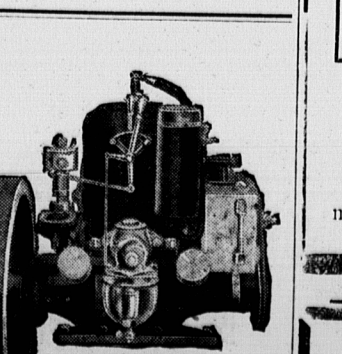
