OBITUARY:—It is our sad duty to-day to chronicle the death of John McFarlan, one of the most respected residents of South Melville, Lot 29, which occurred at his late residence on Wednesday 7th inst at the comparatively early age of 64 years. Deceased was in fair health until a short time previous to his death, when he was attacked by a severe cold, which gradually grew worse, and despite all that medical aid and kind friends could do, surrounded by his loving wife and children, he passed peacefully away, on the morning of the above mentioned date. Mr. McFarlan was a very prosperous and successful farmer and by his industry and perseverance worked out for himself and family a comfortable and well provided home. In his intercourse with his fellowmen he was ever kind, courteous and unassuming; but in his home and family circle he was seen to best advantage, where strangers were always welcome, and kindly entertained. By his ever obliging and genial disposition he made for himself many friends and no enemies and his death will be sincerely mourned by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. He leaves behind him a desolate widow, three sons and two daughters, besides a large circle of relations and acquaintances, to mourn the loss of a kind husband, an affectionate father, a good neighbor and an honest citizen. A proof of the high esteem in which he was held, was manifested by the very large procession (over 100 sleighs) which followed his remains to Black Point Cemetery. The pall-bearers were Messrs James W. Villett, John McKinnon, Charles Dunsford, J. A. Cottle, Edward Trainor and Malcolm Bell. To his bereaved family and other relatives, we extend our sincerest sympathy.
