ATTENDED EXHIBITION CON-
FERENCE—Mr. James Paton re-
turned last evening after an absence
of several weeks spent in Toronto,
Montreal and Guelph. At the latter
city Mr. Paton, as president of the
Prince Edward Island Exhibition
Association, attended the conference
of the Canadian Exhibition Associa-
tion. Hon. Robert Weir, Federal
Minister of Agriculture, was the chief
speaker. While at Toronto Mr. Pa-
ton attended the Royal Winter Fair.

AWAITING ESTIMATES—A t a
meeting of the Government Satur-
day it was decided to ascertain the
estimated cost for repairing the old
Government House, before taking
any steps toward renovating the
building and putting it in condition
to serve as a residence for the newly
appointed lieutenant governor. In
addition to general repairs work is
necessary on the heating system and
plumbing and on the outbuildings.
Premier Lea who, with the archi-
tect, inspected Government House
yesterday, reports the building to be
in much better condition than might
be expected.

SNAPPY P. W. C. MAGAZINE—
The December issue of "The College
Times" just off the press, is both
informative and entertaining. Last

RETURN FROM MARITIME
CONVENTION—Messrs R. L. Cotton
and R. E. Mutch of the Charlotte-
town Board of Trade, and Mr. W. R.
Birch of Alberton, returned last
evening from the conference of the
Maritime Board of Trade held on
Monday and Tuesday last at Moncton.
175 delegates representing 24 differ-
ent boards attended the largest con-
ference of the Maritime Boards ever
held. Resolutions were passed approv-
ing the application of the Associated
Boards for the seven day a week
ferry service between the Island and
the mainland instructing the incom-
ing executive to press for the twenty
percent reduction in ferry rates for
automobiles, and asking the Federal
Government to assist in every way
possible in establishing regular air ser-
vice between the Island and the
mainland.

Board of Governors held at the Uni-
versity tonight. It is to take effect
at the end of the academic year, and
will mark the completion of twenty
years service as President of the in-
stitution.

Drury was in power and investiga-
tion was being made into Mr. Fer-
guson's administration of the De-
partment of Lands and Forests as
a member of the Hearst Government.
Mr. Ferguson declared the investiga-
tion was an attempt to discredit the
Conservative party and said he had
enough ammunition to fight the far-
mer government. At the time he
made his famous prediction, "I will
come through when the time comes
and when I get through some of
these fellows' hides will be on the
fence." After the next election, in
1923, he was prime minister.

Staunch Believer in British Empire

A staunch believer in the British
Empire, Mr. Ferguson has always
been ready to challenge any step
which in his opinion might lead to
its disintegration. It is his firm
conviction in this connection which
have been partly responsible for his
selection for the London post. It is
understood many persons in Great
Britain pressed Mr. Ferguson to ac-
cept Mr. Bennett's offer of the High
Commissionership feeling his ability
to get things done would be valuable
at the present time. In well inform-
ed circles it is said Mr. Ferguson will
be a leader in a movement which is
under way to build up a greater
feeling of unity among the different
parts of the British Empire.

Mr. Ferguson was literally cradled
in politics. His father, the late Dr.
Charles Ferguson, of Kempsville,
Ontario, was a member of the Do-
minion Parliament and a trusted
friend and adviser of Sir John A.
MacDonald. Settling down in his
home town as a lawyer Mr. Ferguson
served on the town council and was
first elected to the Legislature in
1905. Sir William Hearst took him
into the government in 1914 as Min-
ister of Lands and Forests and he
was one of the few cabinet ministers
to survive the election of 1919 which
sent the Conservative party down to
defeat.

RULES OF
THE GAME

The Guardian will publish from
day to day, Rules of the Game as
adopted by the Canadian Amateur
Hockey Association and the Mari-
time Amateur Hockey Association.
These rules are the same as govern
play in the Allan Cup playdowns.

RULES OF COMPETITION
RULE 1

All trophies shall revert to the
Association whenever so ordered by
the Executive.

RULE 2

Each winner of the semi-final
shall be declared champions of and
entitled to hold the trophy belong-
ing to its section, for the ensuing year,
subject to Rule No. 1. All winners in
groups and leagues shall be deter-
mined by the point system of scor-
ing with two points for a win and
one for a tie.

RULE 3

No team shall take part in any As-
sociation match unless the captain
or manager shall have furnished the
referee with a list of the players and
their playing certificates.

RULE 4

Any hockey player, who was a
member of his home team in the
previous season, compelled to leave
his home town in order to obtain
employment elsewhere and returns to
his home town previous to the first
scheduled game of the next season,
shall be allowed to play for his home
team during that season.

RULE 5

(a) Except in the case of home
and home games, any club intending
to default a match must send to the
Secretary of the opposing club, and
also to the Secretary of the Asso-
ciation, at least three days' clear no-
tice, exclusive of the day on which
the match was to have been played.
Unless the Executive shall otherwise
order, any club failing to send such
notice shall be subject to a penalty
of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00), to-
gether with all legitimate expenses
incurred by the competing club in
connection with such match, and
shall in default of payment of such
sum to the competing club within
two weeks of the date arranged for
the match, be struck off the roll of
membership of the M.A.H.A. A club
defaulting any match in a series
shall be dropped from the series, and
the standing of the series shall be
made up as if such club had taken
no part.

(b) In case of home and home
matches between two clubs, the club
accepting and playing the home
game on its own ice shall, in case of
default of the return game on its op-
ponents' ice, pay the opposing club
a sum sufficient to completely cover
the expenses of the club in its first
game, expenses to be hotel and
transportation bills for the men, and
one half the referee's expenses, and
a sum of One Hundred Dollars
(\$100.00) in addition, and shall, in
default of payment of such sum to
the competing club within two weeks
of the date arranged for the match,
be struck off the roll of membership
of the M.A.H.A. Should a club de-
fault the first game of a home and
home series on opponents' ice the
Executive of the League to which
the defaulting club belongs shall
have full authority to take immediate
action.

guson's regime as prime minister
were the enactment of government
control of the sale of liquor and the
repeal of "regulation 17" which plac-
ed restriction on the use of the
French language in the schools of
Ontario. Both measures brought
criticism but on both issues he re-
ceived the endorsement of the peo-
ple to general elections.

To his wife Mr. Ferguson gives
credit for much of his success. Many
important decisions affecting his
career came after a long discussion
in the Ferguson household. Mrs.
Ferguson, before her marriage, was
Ella Cumming, of Buckingham, Que.
She accompanied her husband on
many of his campaign tours. Her
unassuming character and charming
manner will make her universally
popular as Canada's official hostess
in London

(c) Any club winning a champion-
ship of any League who fails to
compete in any play-off games, shall
be suspended by this Association and
notification to this effect to any
such club shall be given by the Sec-
retary within two weeks after date
of such suspension. Any Club so sus-
pended may apply for reinstatement
at the first annual meeting of the
Association after such suspension,
and the Association at that time
may, if it sees fit, impose such pun-
ishment as it deems proper.

In preparing the home government
to come to a new conference in Ot-
tawa next year with an open mind.
In fact, we have gained as much as
we could hope for.

"Canada has gained immeasur-
able in prestige at the conference. I can
say without exaggeration that R. B.
Bennett is regarded by the English
people as a greater statesman than
any other Canadian who has ever
represented Canada in London. What
is more, the people of England are
solidly behind the proposals of the
Dominion as embodied in Mr. Ben-
nett's resolutions and no doubt the
pressure of public opinion in Eng-
land will do a great deal in revising
the point of view of the leaders who
will come to Ottawa next year.

Enthusiastic Receptions for Bennett!
"Everywhere Mr. Bennett received
a most enthusiastic welcome from the
general public. Dublin turned out a
guard of honor of picked men for
his reception and he was vociferously
cheered in Scotland and Sheffield.
Mr. Bennett established a most en-
viable position for Canada in Eng-
land.

"I expect that the next confer-
ence will be held somewhat earlier
in the year in Ottawa, but it is im-
possible to predict the circumstances
under which it will meet. The political
situation in many parts of the Em-
pire is too unstable for that. As far
as purely constitutional and political
questions are concerned, a good deal
of progress was made at the last
conference and the question of the
repeal of the Colonial Laws Validity
Act will be taken up with the Cana-
dian provinces by Mr. Bennett im-
mediately upon his return. There is
nothing known, however, regarding
the proposals which may be made
in order to guarantee to the provin-
ces their rights and protection under
the British North American Act. In
case the Colonial Laws Validity
Act is repealed, Col. Steel concluded

Board of Trade and moved by L. W.

mer years would have preferred to
stay in the Maritimes, but had been
hurried west. P. M. Shannon of
Campbellton called for the placing
of immigrants on new land, declaring
that the future was bright for peo-
ple who would pull stumps and
plough new soil.

The Board decided to urge the
Federal Government for implementa-
tion of the Duncan recommenda-
tion for the establishment in Canada
of coaling plants with a view to
expansion of the market for domestic
coal.

Seven Day Train Service to Island

Charlottetown resolutions calling
for seven day train service to Prince
Edward Island and passenger con-
nection with the Mainland were ap-
proved. Extension of the Guysboro
railway to Canso as a means of pro-
viding transportation facilities for
the fishermen of that district, was
embodied in a resolution sponsored by
H. A. Rice, Canso.

P. E. I. Methods Western Guardian
Cited As Example

To N. B. Growers

The high standard maintained by
Prince Edward Island potato grow-
ers and shippers is recognized in the
following editorial comment from St.
John Telegraph Journal:

For years the efforts of the Tele-
graph-Journal have been directed to
improving the potato trade of this
Province. Stricter inspection of po-
tatoes was advocated on many oc-
casions. Despite that fact inferior
stock was shipped from this province
to all parts of Canada and the West
Indies. Just who was responsible for
this condition the Telegraph-Journal
is not prepared to say, but the fact
remains that potatoes unfit for con-
sumption were sent out and labelled
New Brunswick potatoes. It was not
until New Brunswick potatoes came
into competition with high grade
stock from Prince Edward Island
that New Brunswick shippers experi-
enced a change of heart. It was then
that compulsory inspection was ad-
vocated. Even with compulsory in-
spection the grade of potato stock in
New Brunswick is not as high as
that maintained in Prince Edward
Island, or at least this was the con-
dition a week ago. Unless New Brun-
swick potatoes grade as high or high-
er than stock they compete against,
they cannot hope to hold the open
market.

There is another great difference
in regard to the method of handling
potatoes in this province and in
Prince Edward Island. On the Island
potatoes are largely handled co-
operatively and with close supervi-
sion of the Deputy Minister of Agricul-
ture in that province. In New Brun-
swick potatoes are largely handled by
dealers who are to be congratulated
now that they have decided to im-
prove their method of handling stock
shipped from here.
