NEWSY NOTES

The Whale at Bayfield
 Into my note-book has just been entered: "A whale 68 feet long—the biggest ever seen in that section—came ashore near Bayfield on the north shore about 12 miles west of East Point." (Guardian, Jan. 11, 1944).

From its size I take this whale to be the Rorqual or Finned Whale (Balaenoptera musculus) which may attain a length of 100 feet but is usually 65 to 70 feet. The next in size is the Humpback Whale (Genus Megaptera), with a body length of 100 feet but does not exceed 50 feet in length. One could have wished for more details of the monster, but assuming that it was a rorqual, here are some points of distinction. The head is small, flat, and pointed in front. The body is slender and elongated ("stream-lined") as compared with the Humpback which is more barrel-shaped. The pectoral limb or "fin" (nearest the eye) is small, narrow and pointed. (That of the Humpback is very long—about one-quarter as long as the animal; whales are not fish) narrow and waved or indented at the edge. Both have plates of baleen or "whalebone" in the mouth, which act as strainers. I shall be glad if Mr. Augustus McDonald can send any particulars which will help me to identify this whale.

Here are a few of the uses to which Black-fish oil is put: and they may possibly work in the case of the oil from the Bayfield Blackfish (another kind of whale) were stranded on Cape Breton Island. From 50 bottles 650 gallons of oil were obtained. The fishermen rendered them for oil which was used as motor lubricant, and also as paint oil for which it had a very satisfactory "body." It was also used as harness oil and burned in lamps like kerosene. (Extract from Circular, Dept. of Fisheries).

In June 1927 a school of Blackfish came ashore near Annapolis, P. E. I. They were rendered for oil and the fish were also used as foxfeed.

I have gathered a considerable amount of information on our Cetaceans as the whales are collectively called, and, where possible, would be glad to have snapshots of any that are stranded on our shores.

THE REAPING

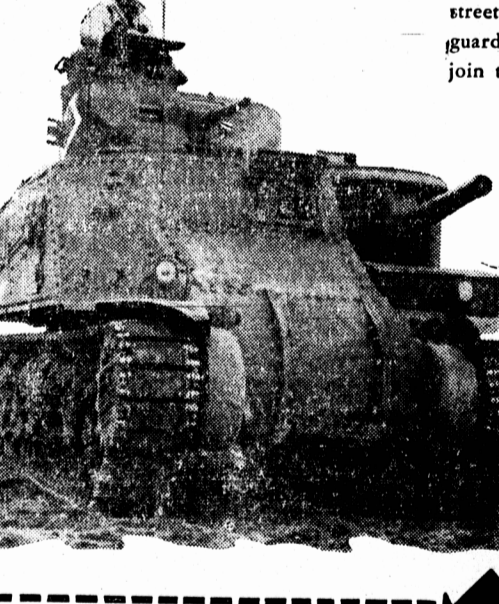
Berlin, from which Nazism will rule the world for the next thousand years, was the birthplace of Blitzkrieg.
