St. Louis, Mo. Sept. 8.—Marconi is here, accompanied by several officials of his company. He was given a dinner at the St. Louis Club by the officials of the exposition company. Marconi's visit here is for the purpose of consulting with the exposition officials in regard to the proposed establishment of a wireless telegraph station on the fair grounds.

### \$1000 DAMAGE DONE.

ALBANY, N. Y. Sept. 8.—At Dumbarton along the Erie canal, a little muskrat has cost the state of New York nearly \$10,000. The muskrat burrowed into the canal bank from the outside, and the minute it got through the bank to the water the damage was done. More than 100 men were engaged in repairing the break, and nearly two score of boats were held up between Syracuse and Utica.

### SALISBURY'S FUNERAL COST BUT \$70.

LONDON, Sept. 7.—Lord Salisbury's funeral, by his express wish, was not to cost more than \$100. As a matter of fact it cost only \$70. The late Duke of Westminster set the example of cheap funerals, the outlay for his having been only \$35. ## PARLIAMENT DEALING WITH NEW DIRECT STEAMER LINE WITH FRANCE.

Eighteen Trips, With Bordeaux the Port on the Other Side—Guarding Against Americans Reaping Benefits—Mr. Borden Better, and Expects to be Back in House Saturday.

OTTAWA, Sept. 8.—This morning in the red from steel was passed through committee and read a third time. Mr. Fielding said that one-third of the importations of structural iron and rods were manufactured in Canada, the amount of the bounty would be about \$150,000 for the year. Sir Wilfrid Laurier moved the house into committee on a resolution for establishing a direct steamship line with France. The premier said a contract was made with Colomier Bros., and would be presented to the house. It provides for eighteen trips twelve in summer and six in winter. The line would run between Canada and Bordeaux. For years the necessity for this line was recognized and admitted. A subsidy of \$50,000 was voted in 1806 and this was afterwards increased to \$100,000 when a contract was entered into with some parties including Mr. Clergue, of Sault St. Marie, but it fell through. Canada had a commerce treaty with France, but advantage could not be taken of it without a direct line on account of the surtax on all goods not sent direct.

Mr. Monk agreed with the desirability of establishing a direct line with France. A good business could be worked up. The committee rose and reported progress. After recess the proposed French line subsidy was discussed. The premier's attention was directed to the fact that the line might be used for carrying American goods, and in this way Canada would be paying to carry goods to compete with their own. This, it was said, was done in the case of the line between South Africa and Canada. Sir Wilfrid Laurier said that the minister of trade and commerce was looking into the statement made about the South African line. In the case of the French line subsidy, Canadian goods would have the preference. The committee rose and reported progress.

A resolution was adopted making provisions for an extra judge on the Northwest Territories bench. Another resolution providing for an extra judge for the exchequer court, division of Ontario was adopted. In the afternoon the bill for appointment of an exchequer division court for Ontario was passed through the committee stage. The bill is merely to carry out what was provided for by the legislature of the province.

Mr. Fielding's bill providing for the establishment of penny banks was passed through committee and read a third time. An amendment was made by the minister of finance providing that in the case of a chartered accountant who makes false returns shall be liable to the same penalty as other officials of the bank.

A bill providing for the bounties on lead contained in lead bearing ores mined in Canada, was read a third time.

### STEEL AND IRON BOUNTY.

A bill providing for bounties on steel and iron and to provide for the payment of bounties on certain articles manufactured from steel was passed through committee and read a third time.
